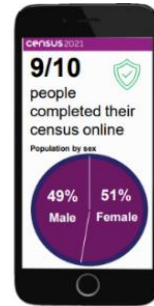

The census happens every 10 years and gives a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. **Census Day was on 21st March 2021.**

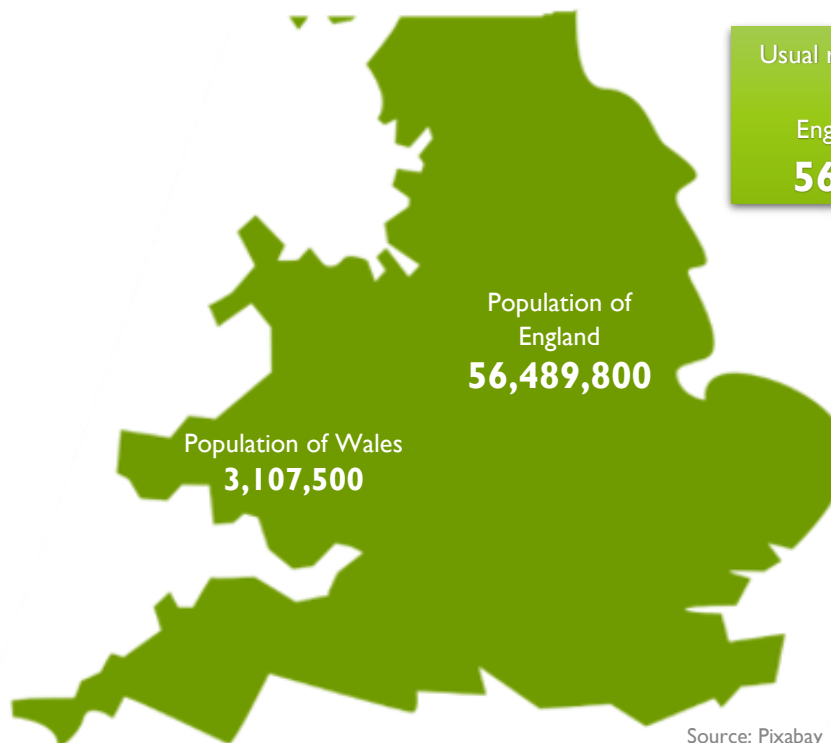
The census asks questions about you, your household and your home. In doing so, it helps to build a detailed snapshot of our society. This report covers Surrey Heath and includes comparisons to the 2011 Census, including Surrey's ten other local authorities and the South East.

## POPULATION

There were 59,597,300 people living in England and Wales on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2021. This is over 3.5 million more (6.3%) than in 2011 and is the largest census population ever recorded.

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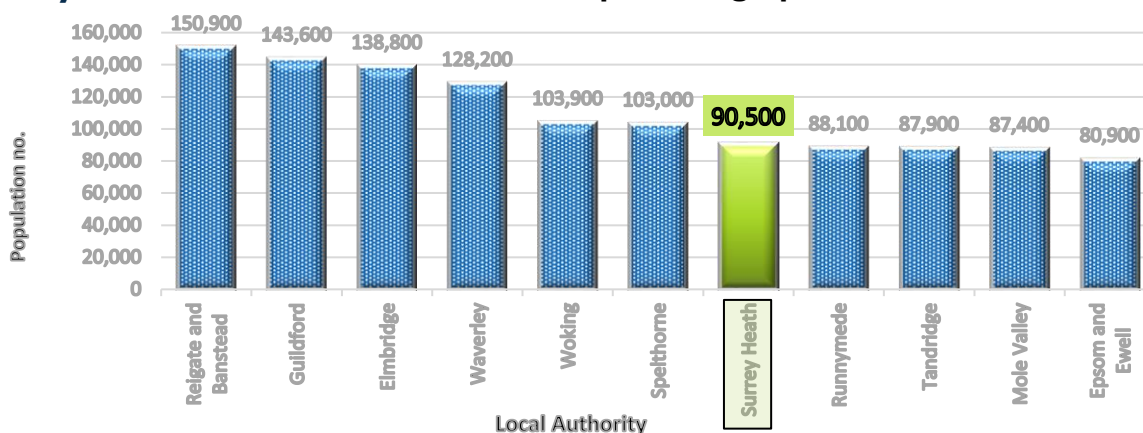
### South East

Surrey Heath was ranked the 270th local authority in population size in England in 2021 falling 5 places from 265th in 2011.

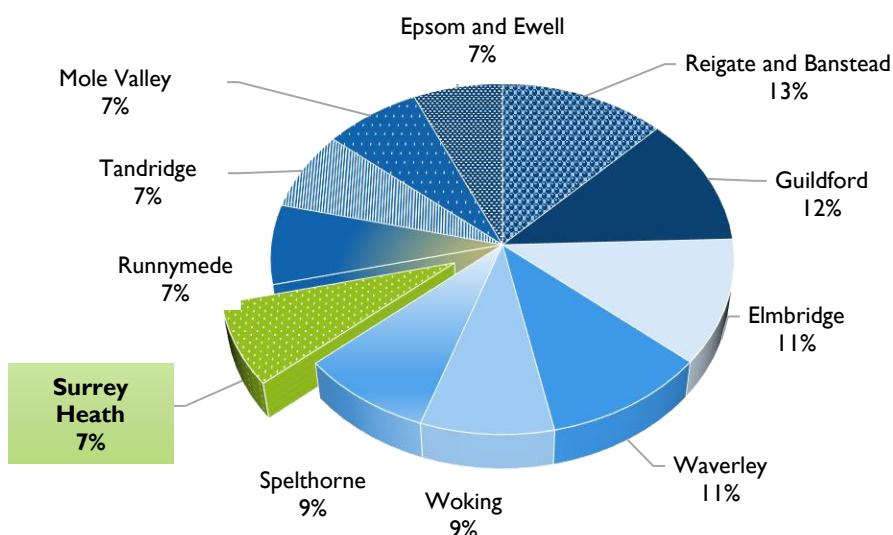
The largest population increase in the South East were seen in Dartford and Milton Keynes where the populations has grown by 20% and 15% respectively.



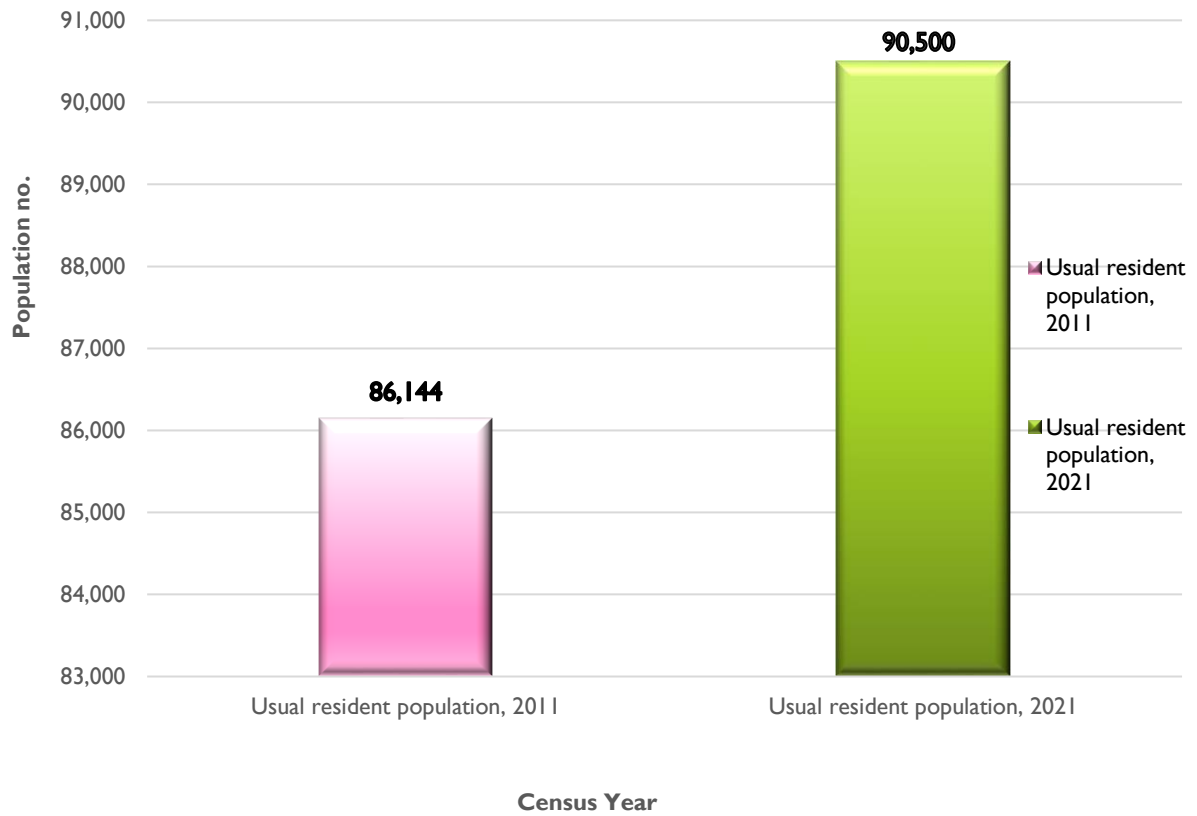
### Surrey Local Authorities: Resident Population graph

## POPULATION CHANGE

The resident population of Surrey, counted by the 2021 Census, was 1,203,100. This represents an increase of 70,710 (6.2%) since 2011.

All Surrey borough / district councils showed growth since 2011, with the highest growth seen in Reigate and Banstead (9.5%) and the lowest in Mole Valley (2.4%).

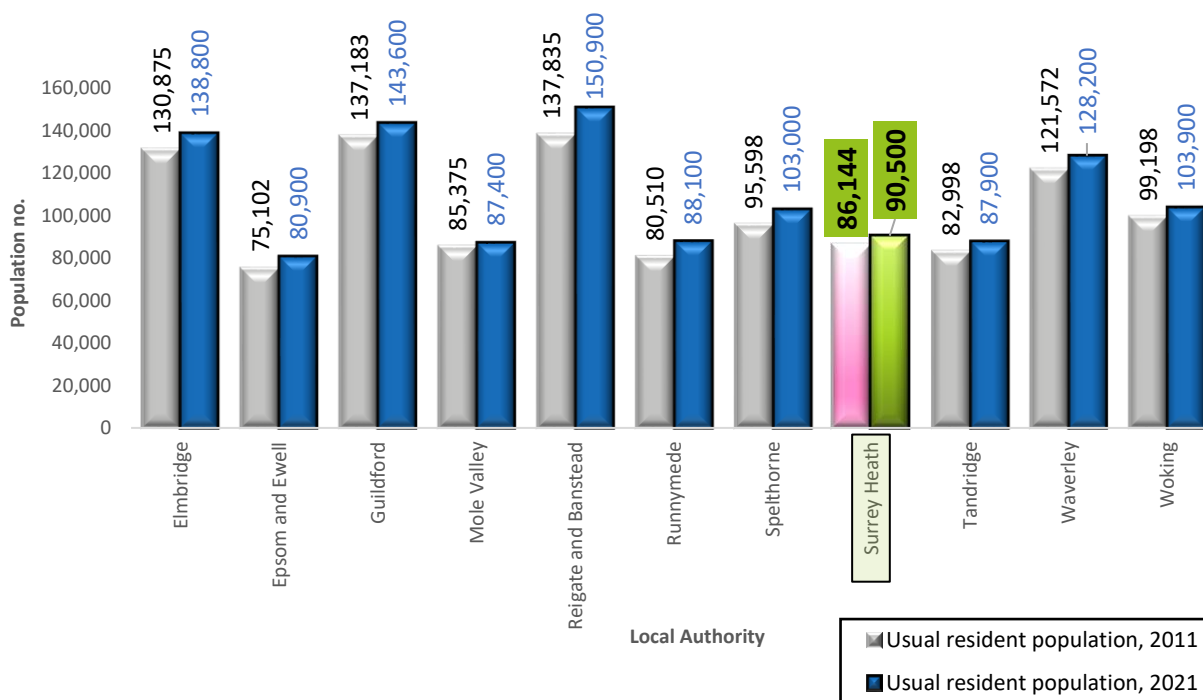
**Surrey Heath's population grew from 86,144 in 2011 to 90,500 in 2021** a growth of **5.1%**. This is lower than the overall increase for England (6.6%), and lower than the increase for the South East (7.5%). Surrey Heath had the 4<sup>th</sup> lowest growth rate in Surrey from 2011.

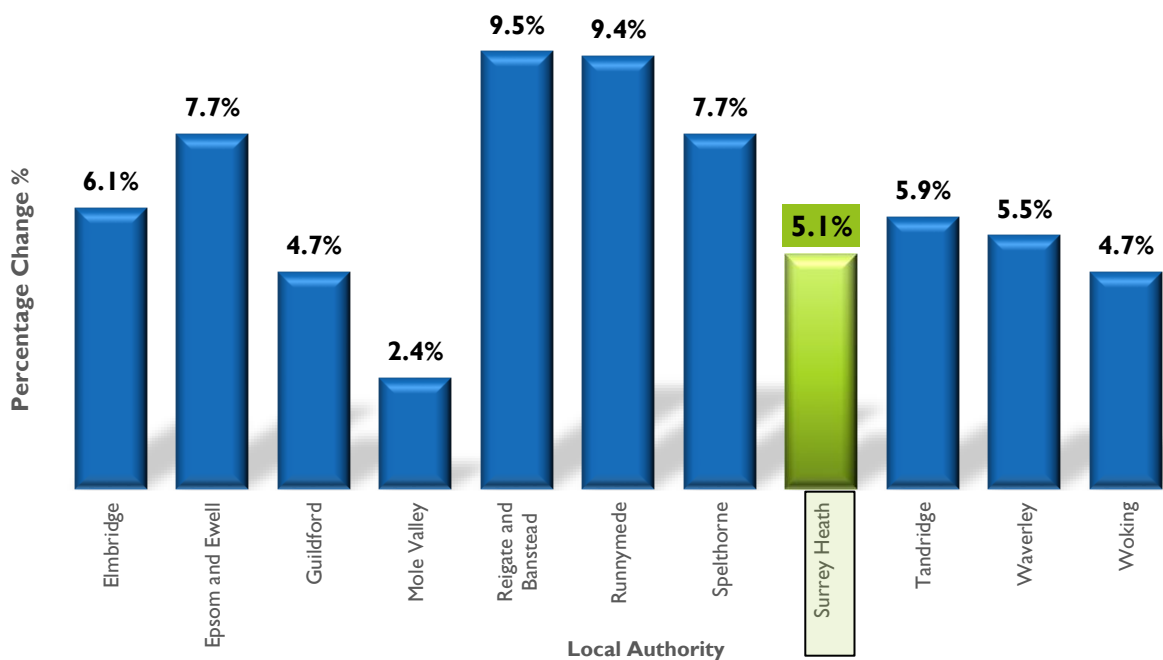

# BIRTHS

There were 624,828 live births in England and Wales in 2021, an increase of 1.8% from 616,936 in 2020, but still below the 2019 figure (640,370); 2021 remains in line with the long term trend of decreasing live births seen before the coronavirus pandemic.

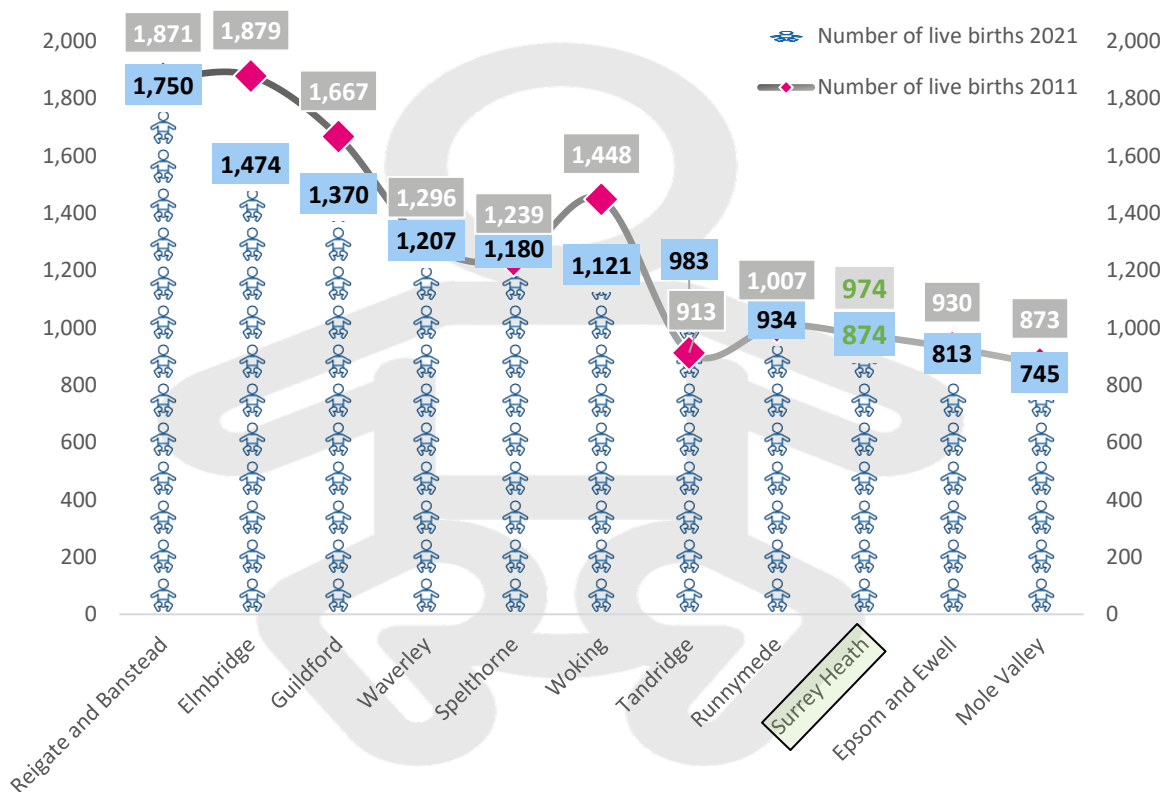
The national stillbirth rate in 2021 increased to 4.1 stillbirths per 1,000 total births compared with 3.8 in 2020; this is higher than the rate seen before the coronavirus pandemic in 2019.

Surrey Heath’s birth rate decreased by 10% (100 births) to 874 in 2021.

Tandridge was the only local authority within Surrey where the birth rate increased, by 8% (70 births).

Woking’s birth rate decreased the most by 23% (327 births)

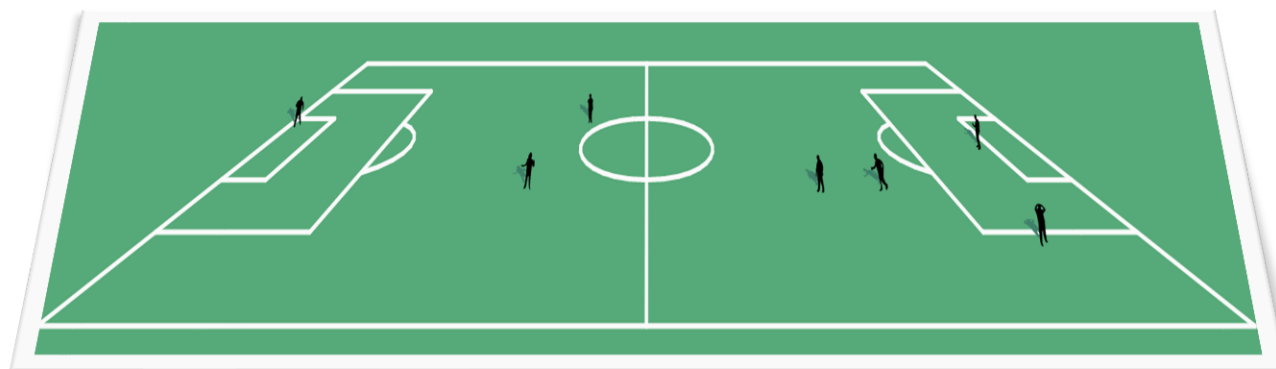
## Surrey Local Authorities: Number of Live Births in Surrey graph (2011 vs 2021 comparison)

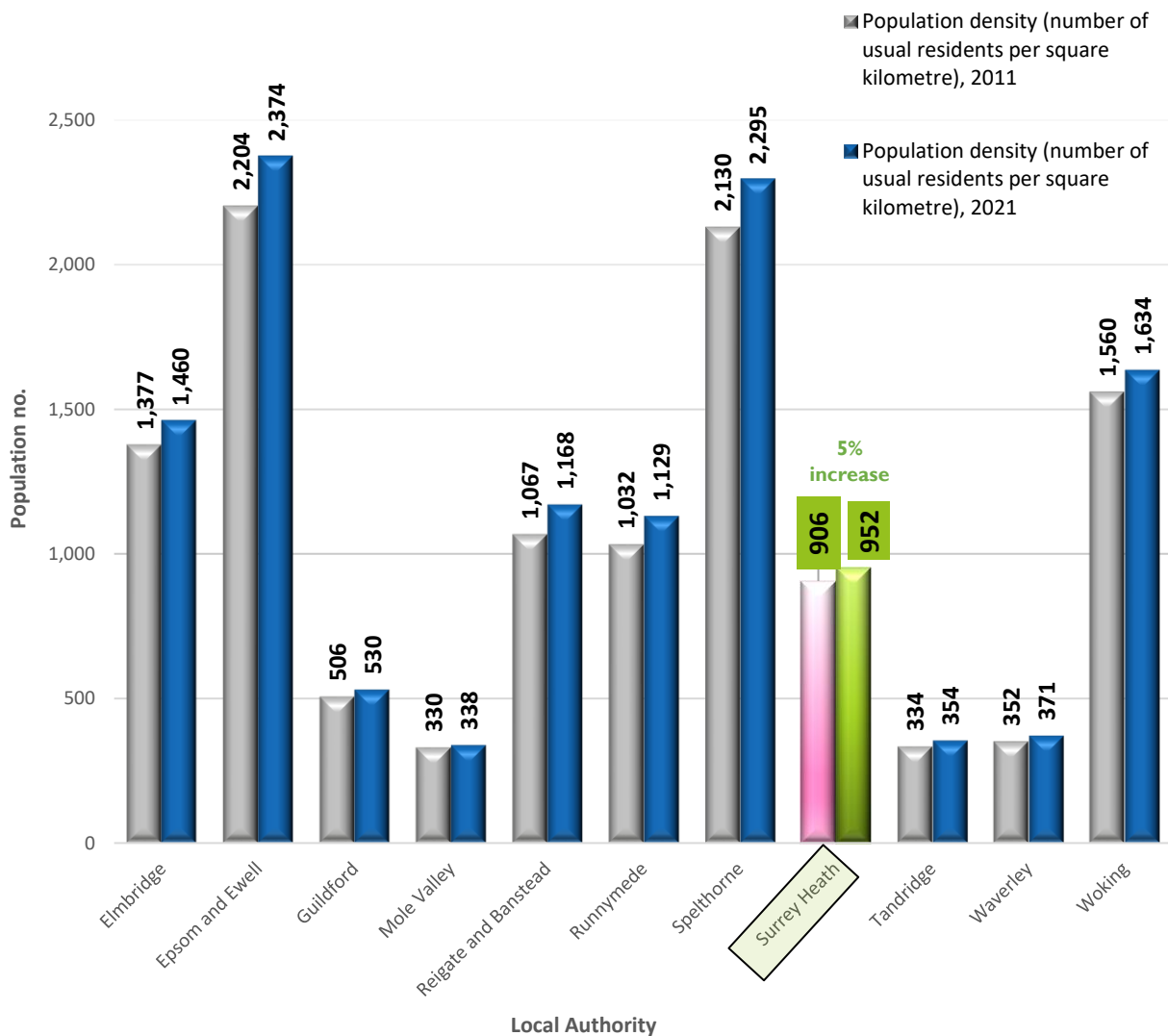

## Surrey Local Authorities: Population Density Graph

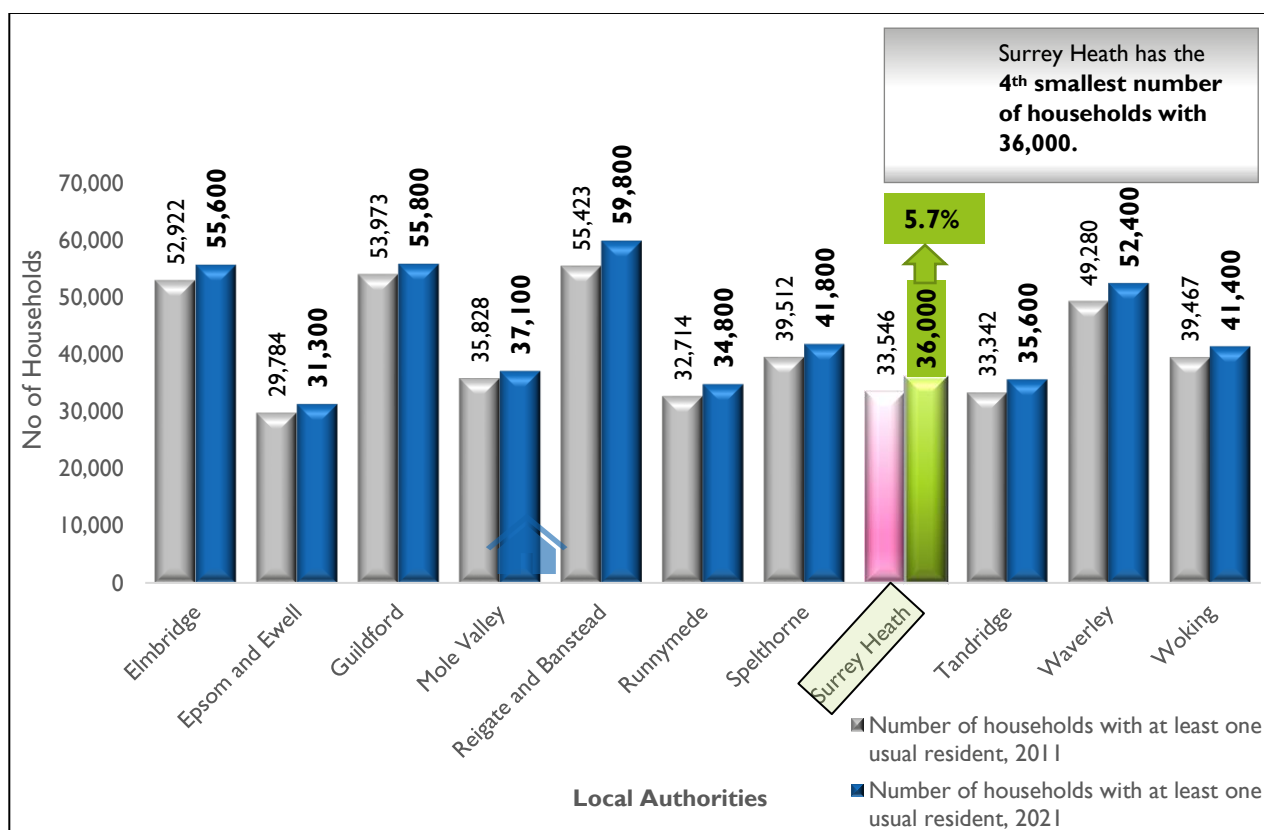


## HOUSEHOLDS

The total number of households in Surrey, established by the 2021 Census, was 481,800. This is an increase of 5.7% (26,009) since the previous Census.

All Surrey local authorities saw an increase in average household size compared to the previous Census.

### Surrey Local Authorities: Changes in the Number of Households - households with at least one usual resident graph (2011 vs 2021)



The imputed average household size (mean average of residents per household) was 2.50 for Surrey – a higher value than for England as a whole.

Amongst borough and district councils, average household size varies from 2.36 in Mole Valley to 2.58 (Epsom and Ewell).

Surrey Heath and Woking have the joint 5<sup>th</sup> highest average household size (people per household) with 2.51.

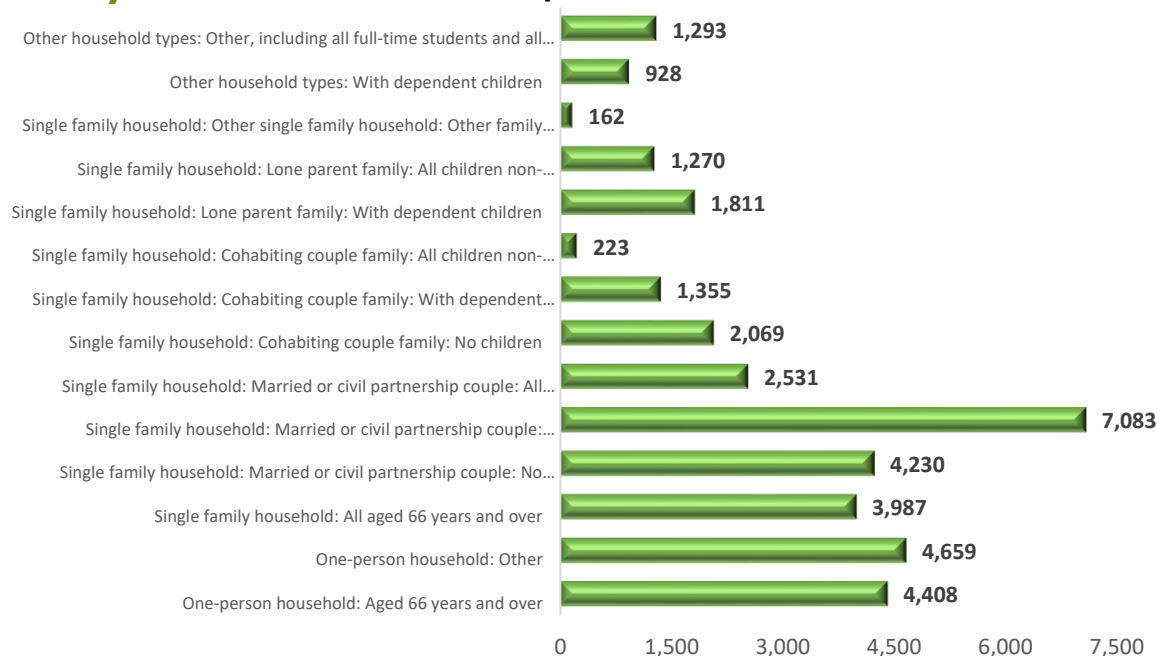

### Definition

**Education:** No person in the household has at least five or more GCSE passes (grade A\* to C or grade 4 and above) or equivalent qualifications, and no person aged 16 to 18 years is a full-time student

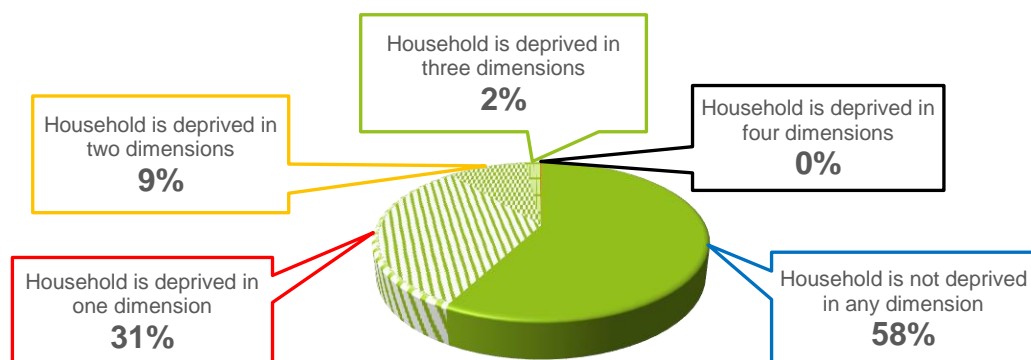
**Employment:** Where any member of a household, who is not a full-time student, is either unemployed or long-term sick

**Health and Disability:** Any person in the household has general health that is “bad” or “very bad” or is identified as disabled

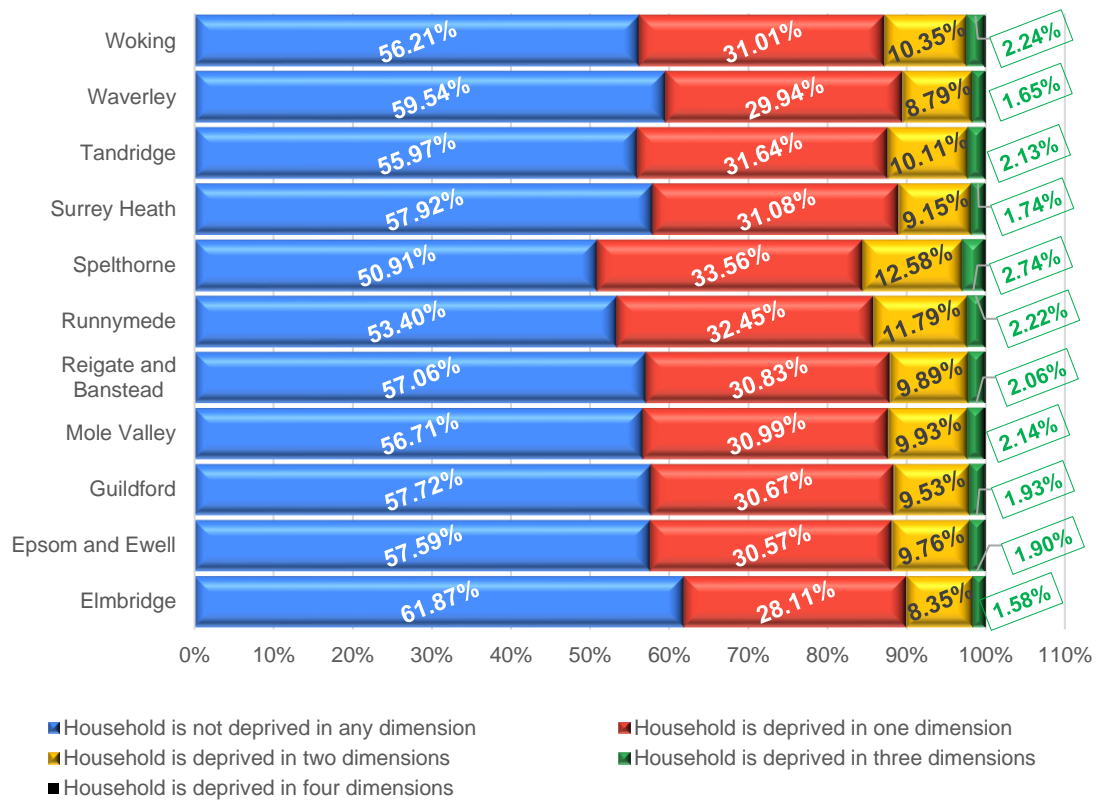
**Housing:** The household’s accommodation is either overcrowded, with an occupancy rating of negative 1 or less (implying that it has one fewer room or bedroom required for the number of occupants), or is in a shared dwelling, or has no central heating

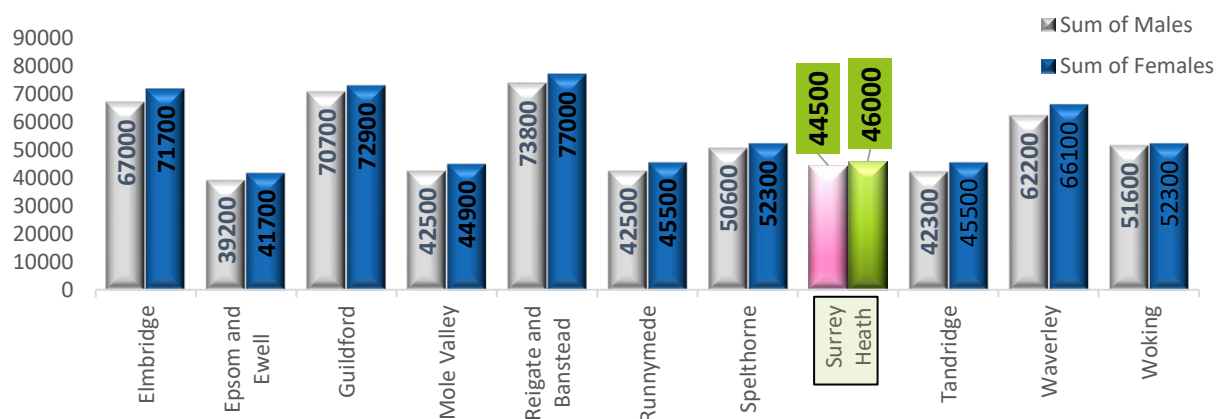

## AGE

*What is your date of birth?*

The largest 5 year cohort across Surrey are those aged 50-54 years, with a population of 87,300.

The number of the Surrey population aged 4 years or below has decreased by 8.0% since the previous Census.

The fastest growing cohort in Surrey compared to previous Census are those aged 70-74 years, with a growth of 34% (an additional 14,834 persons). This group reflects the post-WWII baby boom.

Other older age groups have also increased in Surrey are those aged 75-79 years by 18.2%, and those aged 80 or older by 14.5%.



At a local authority level, the largest increases in the number of older people are:

- 44.4% increase in the 70-74 age group in Reigate and Banstead
- 37.5% increase in those aged 80 or above in Surrey Heath
- 28.3% increase in 75-79 year olds in Tandridge

A decrease of -7.3% was observed across England, indicating that birth rates have fallen since 2016/17. This age group has fallen in all areas other than Runnymede (where it remained unchanged), with the largest decrease observed in Guildford, which saw a 17.4% reduction in the number of preschool children across the past decade.

Amongst borough and districts, Elmbridge had the highest proportion of younger residents (at 25.6%), and Mole Valley the lowest (21.4%).

Woking had the highest proportion of 'working age' residents (59.3%) and Waverley the lowest (54.1%).



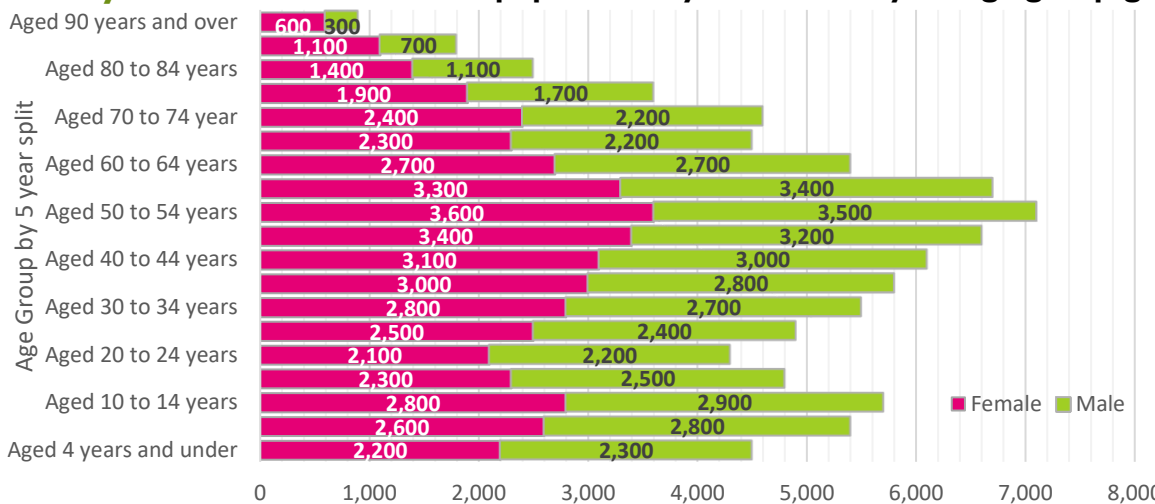

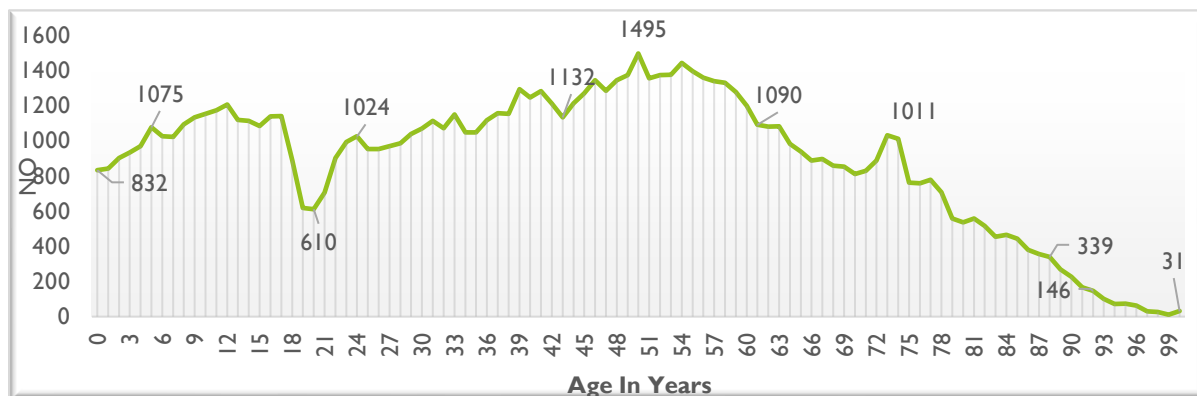

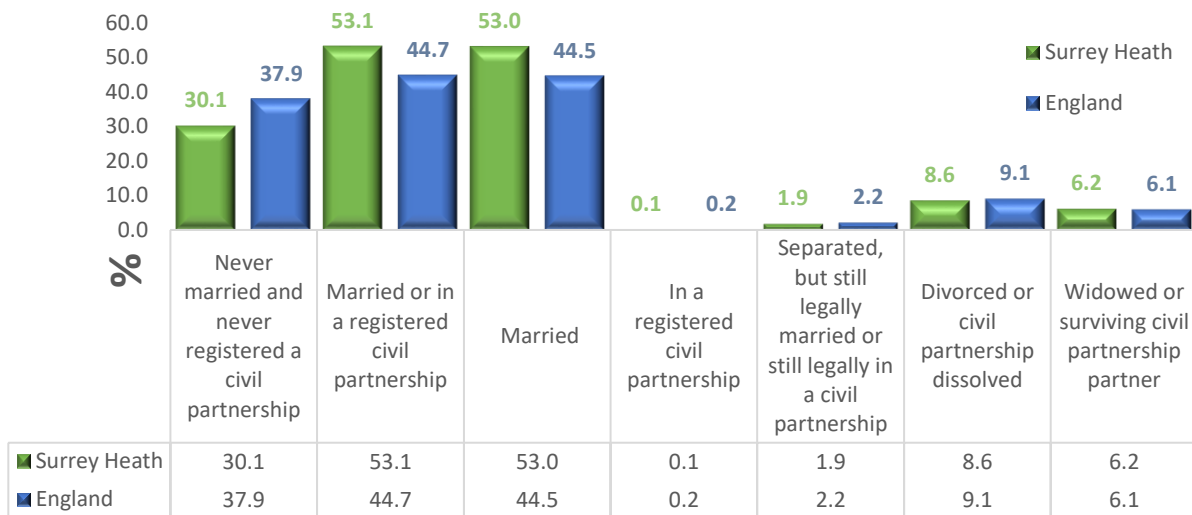

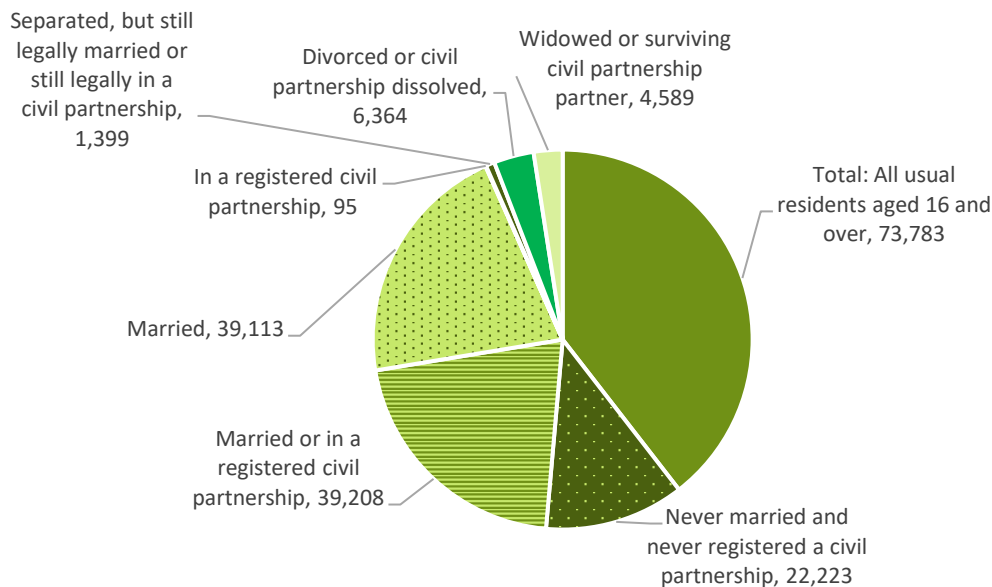

## Surrey Heath and England: Marital and Civil Partnership Status graph

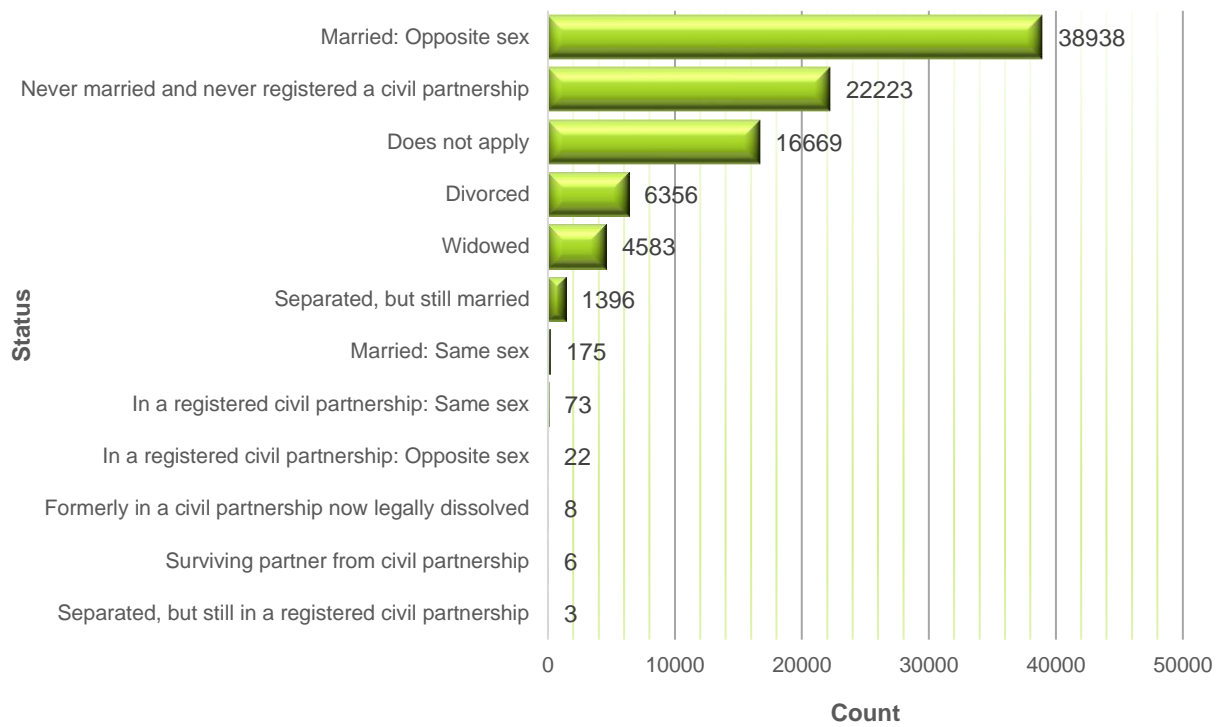


## Surrey Heath: Marital and Civil Partnership Status graph

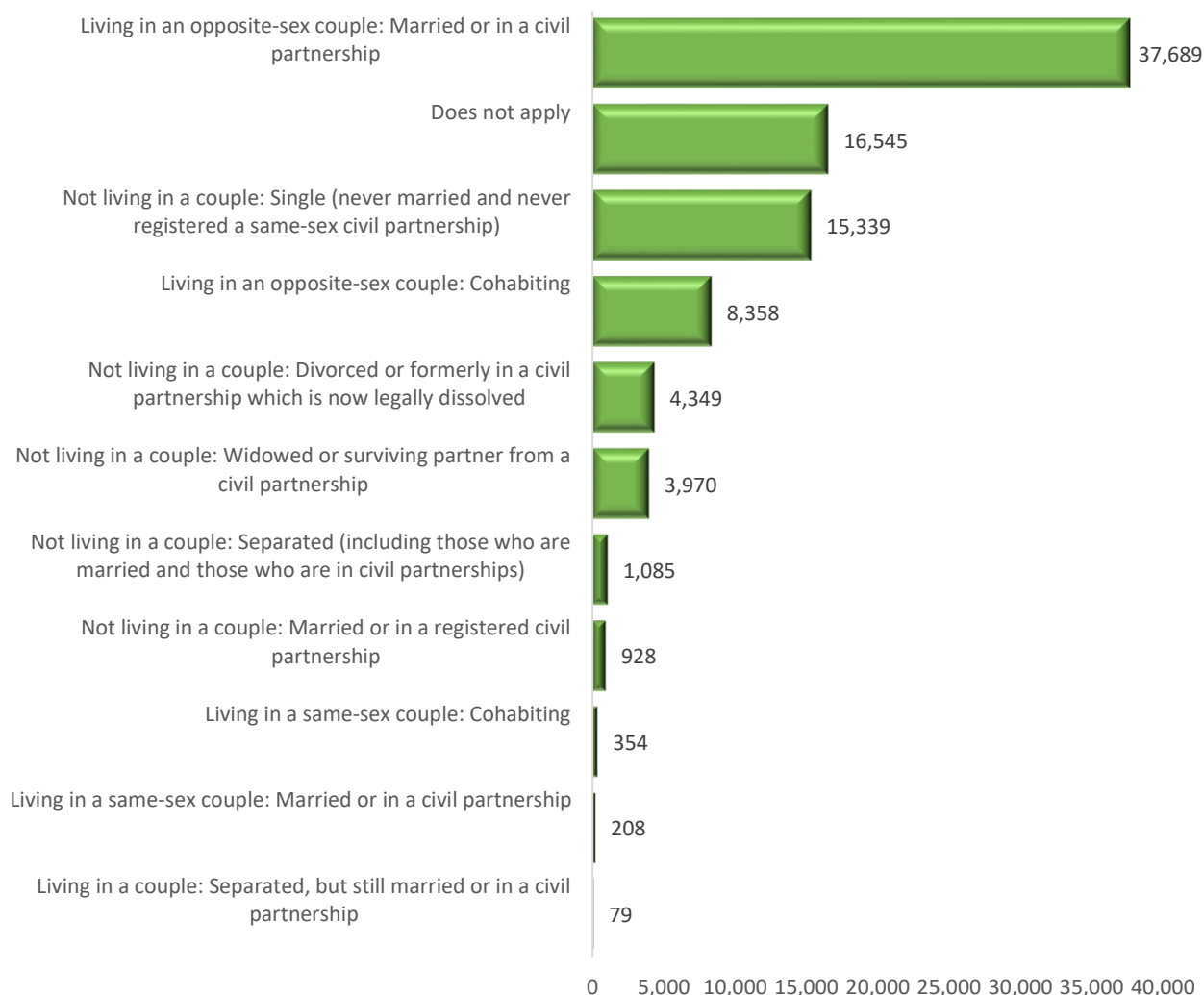




# LIVING ARRANGEMENTS

The “living arrangements” classification combines responses to the question on marital and civil partnership status with information about whether or not a person is living in a couple. This topic is only applicable to people in households. Living arrangements differs from marital and civil partnership status because cohabiting takes priority over other categories. 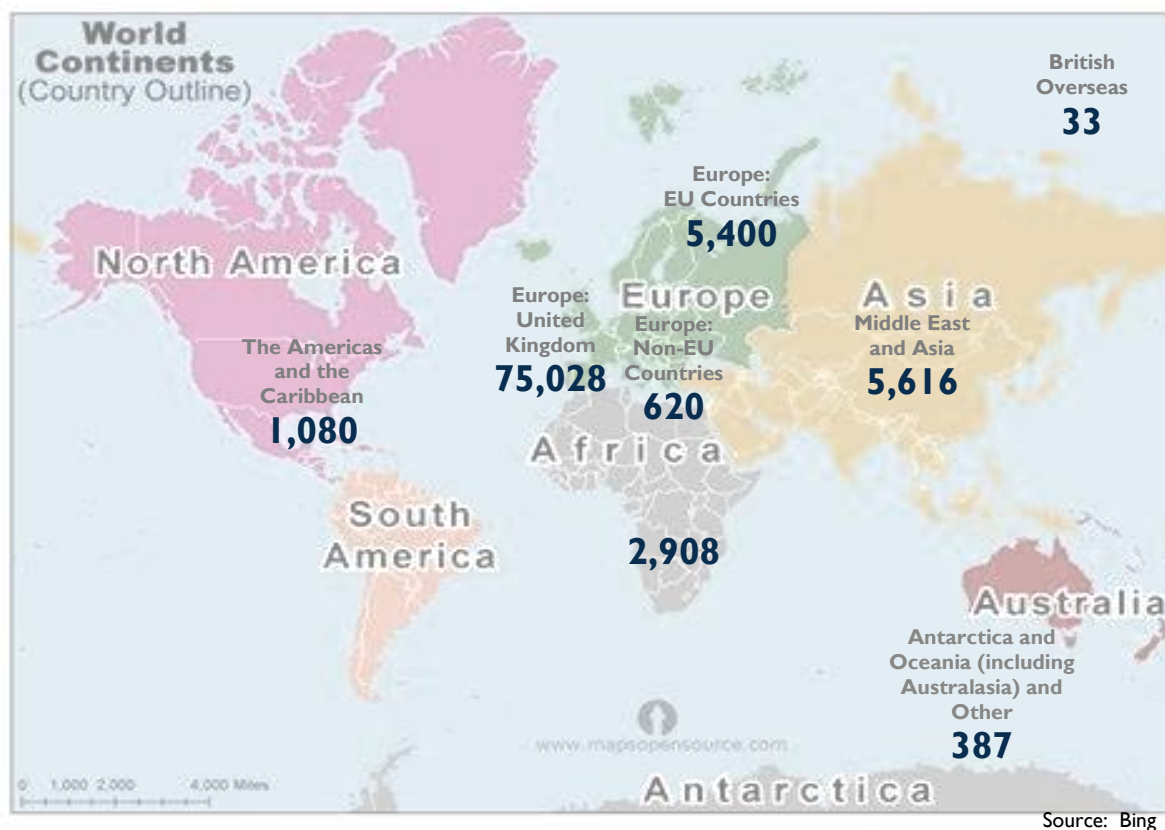
## Surrey Heath: Living Arrangements graph

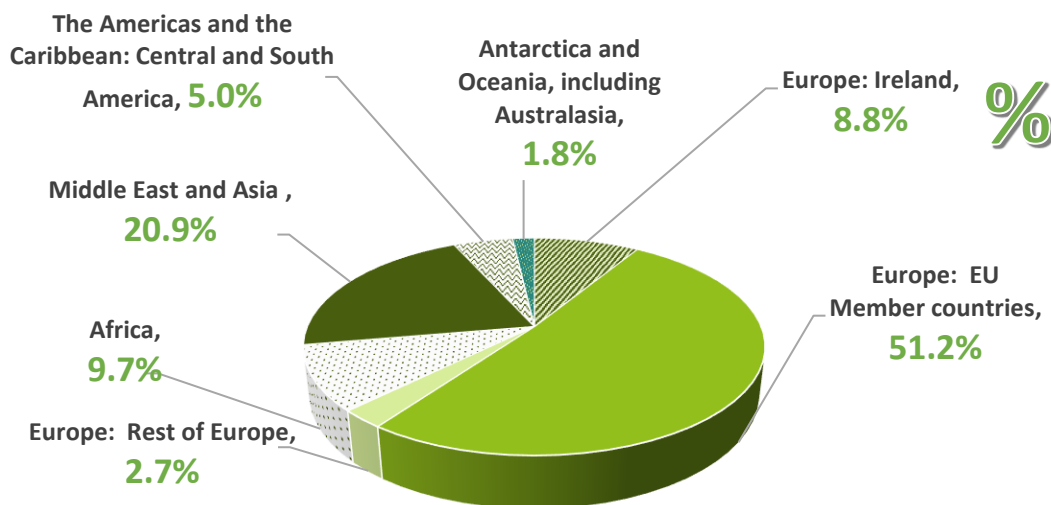

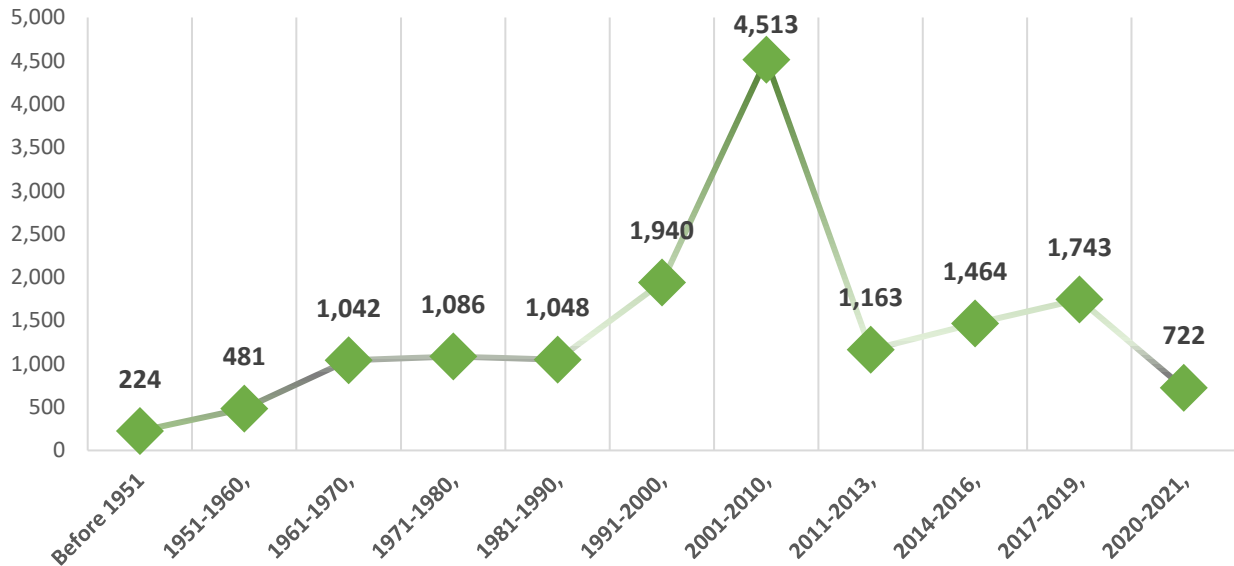

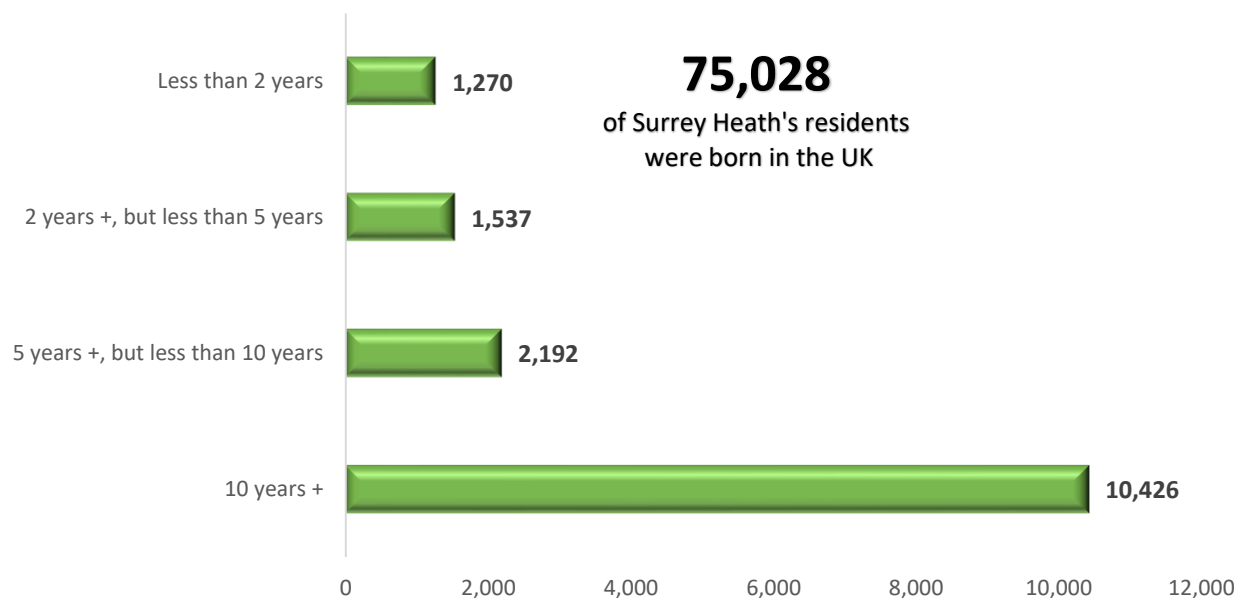

## NATIONAL IDENTITY

### How would you describe your national identity?

#### England and Wales

Someone's national identity is a self-determined assessment of their own identity; it could be the country or countries where they feel they belong or think of as home. It is not dependent on ethnic group or citizenship.

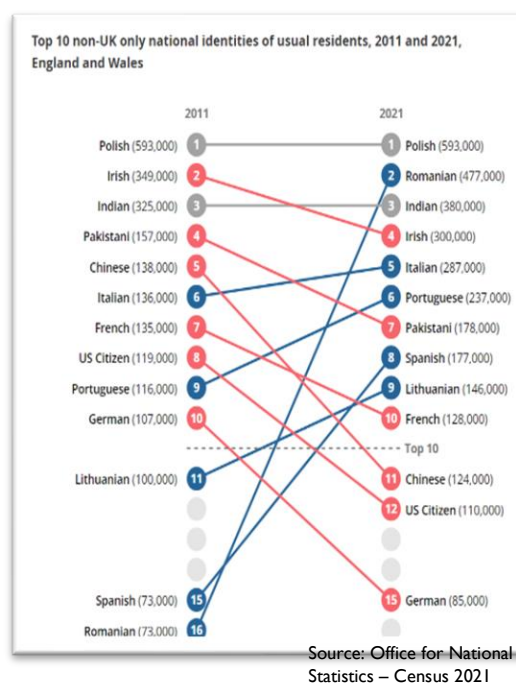
This question allows respondents to select all identities that apply. The term "only" is used to refer to respondents classified with a single national identity.

Out of all those who selected only a **non-UK national identity**, the most common response was **"Polish" only (1.0%, 593,000)**. This was also the most common response in **2011 (when 1.1%, or 593,000, selected a "Polish" only identity)**.

The **largest increase** was for those who chose a **"Romanian" only identity**, which rose to **0.8% (477,000)** in 2021 from 0.1% (73,000) in 2011. This made **Romanian the second most common non-UK identity**, up from sixteenth in 2011.

Census 2021 data **on international migration and language** show similar between-census increases in the Romanian population and those who have Romanian as a main language. These increases are likely driven by working restrictions for Romanian citizens being lifted in 2014.

In 2011, the second most common non-UK only identity was "Irish", at 0.6% (349,000). The 2021 data show a decrease to 0.5% (300,000), making it the fourth most common. The decline of almost 50,000 was the greatest decrease for any non-UK identity.

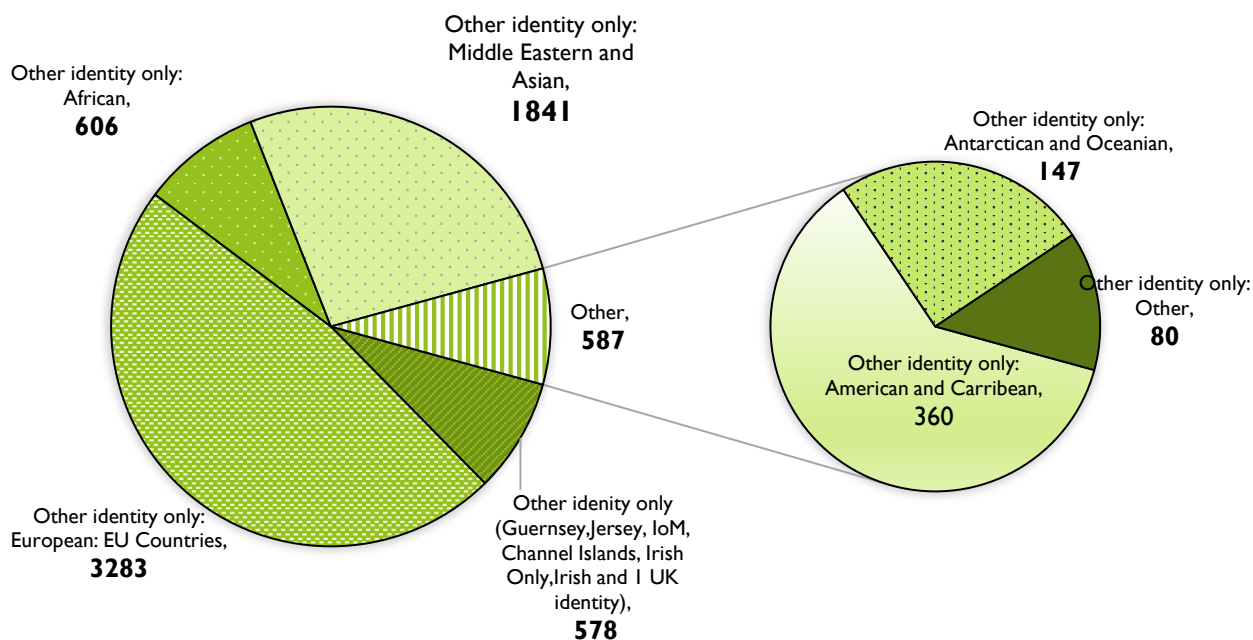

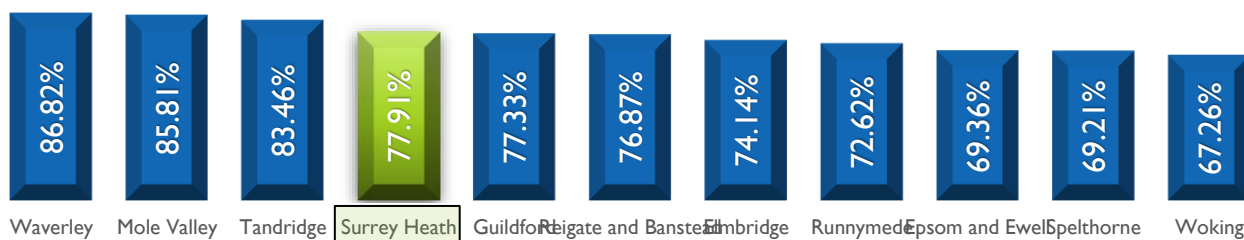

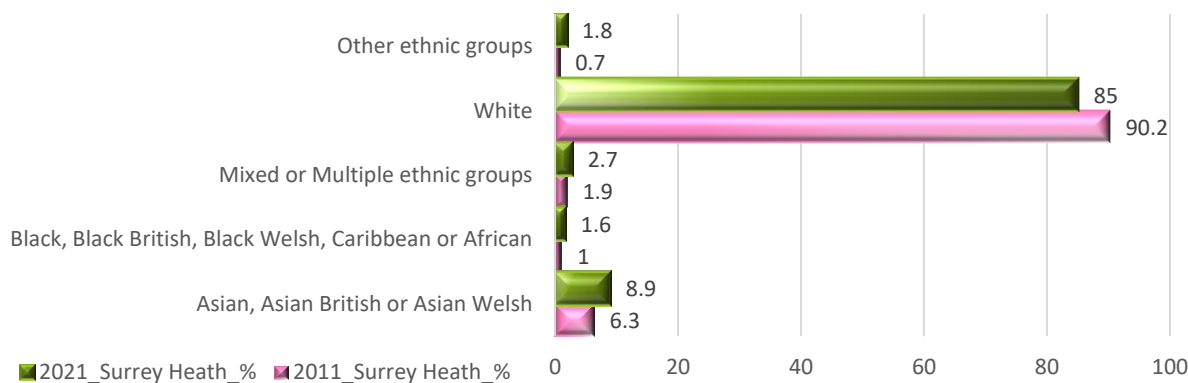

## RELIGION

### “What is your religion?”

The religion question was voluntary. 90,457 out of 90,500 people (99.95%) from Surrey Heath answered this question.

Elmbridge, Mole Valley and Waverley had the highest percentage of those who answered Christian with 52%.

Epsom and Ewell, Guildford and Woking the lowest percentage of Christians with 48%.

All Surrey Local Authorities answered ‘Christian’, ‘No Religion’ or ‘Not Answered’ as the Top 3 answers, apart from Woking where Muslim (9%) came in at third place.

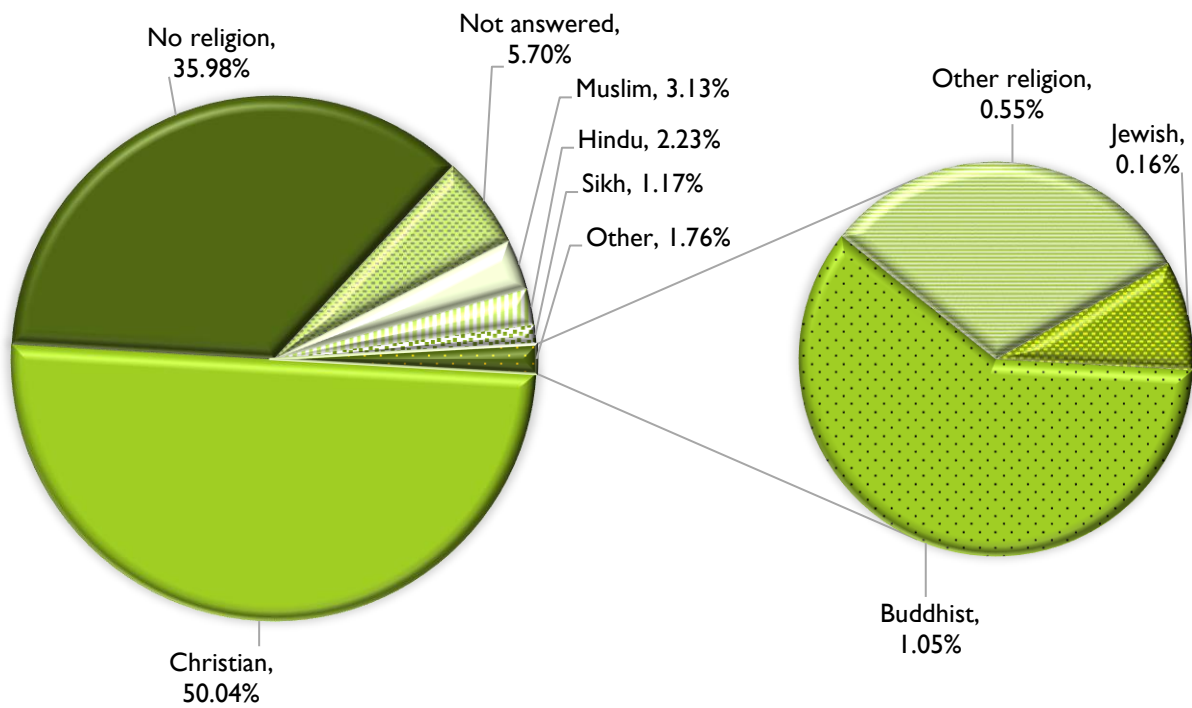

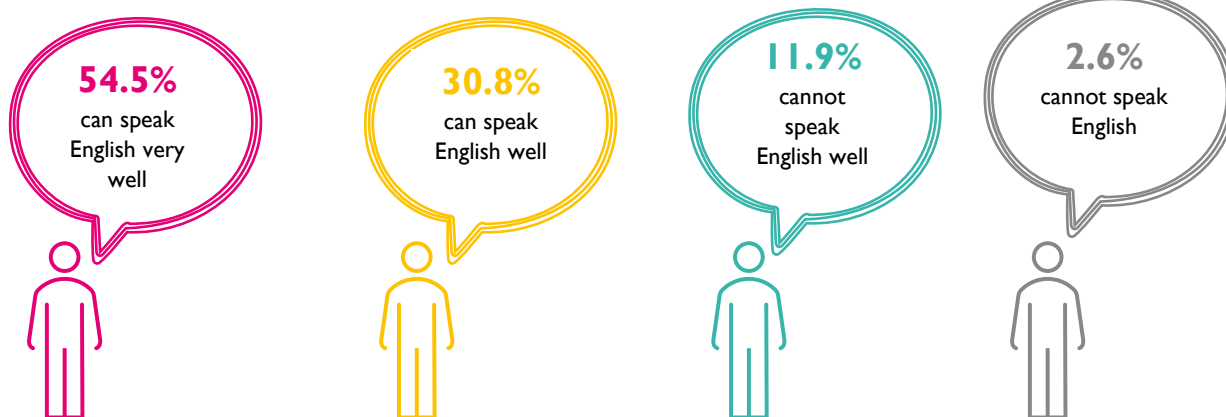

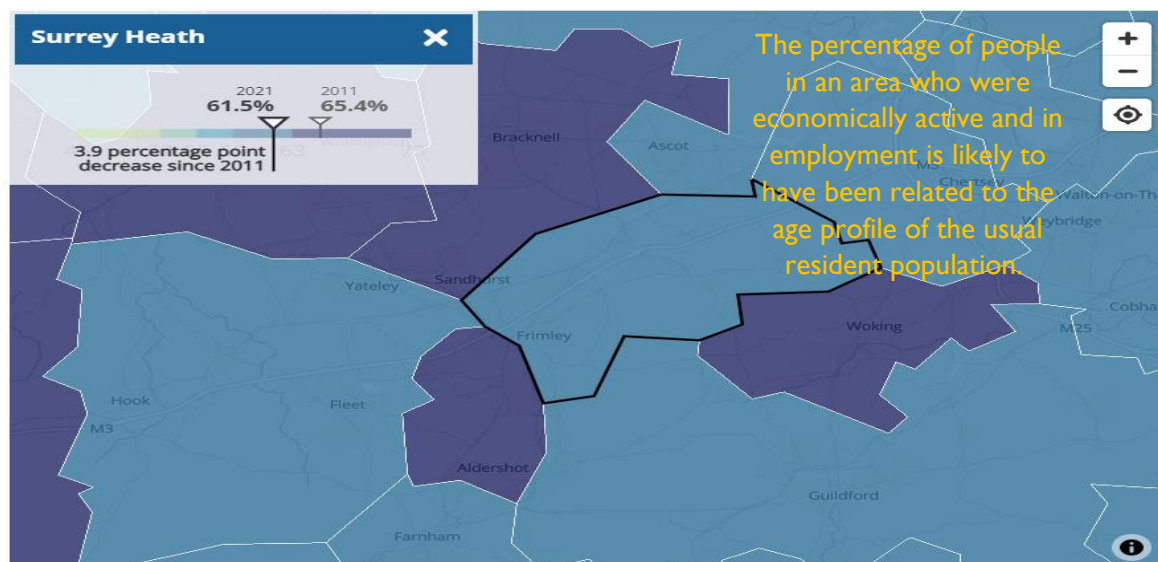

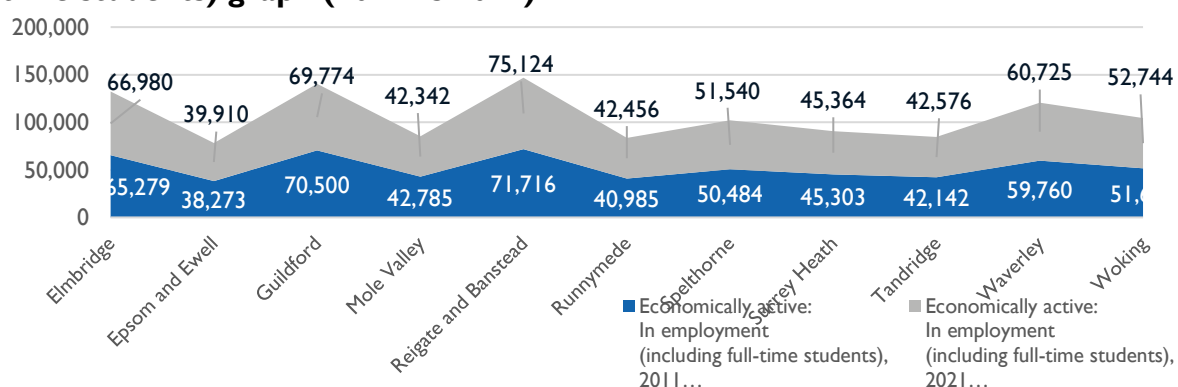

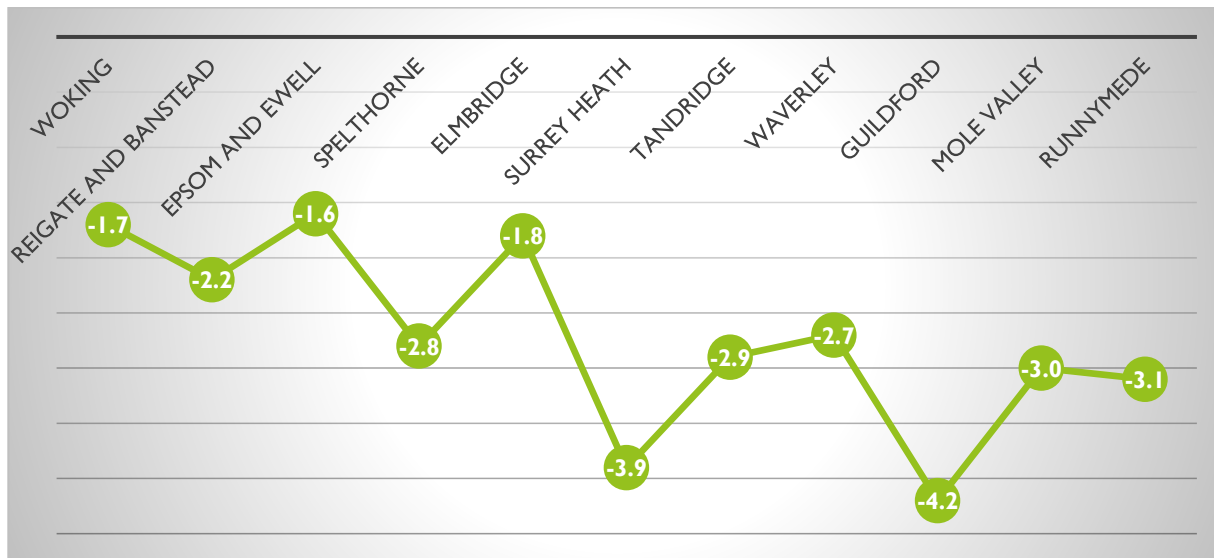

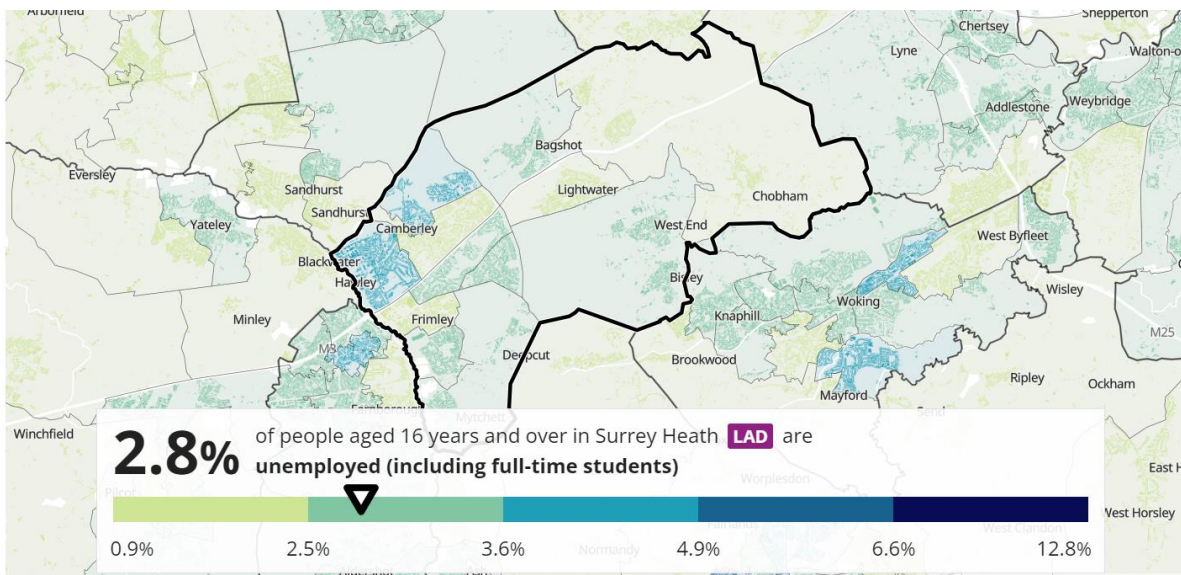
## Surrey Local Authorities: Economically active: In employment (including full-time students) graph (2011 vs 2021)

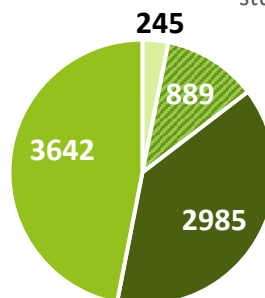

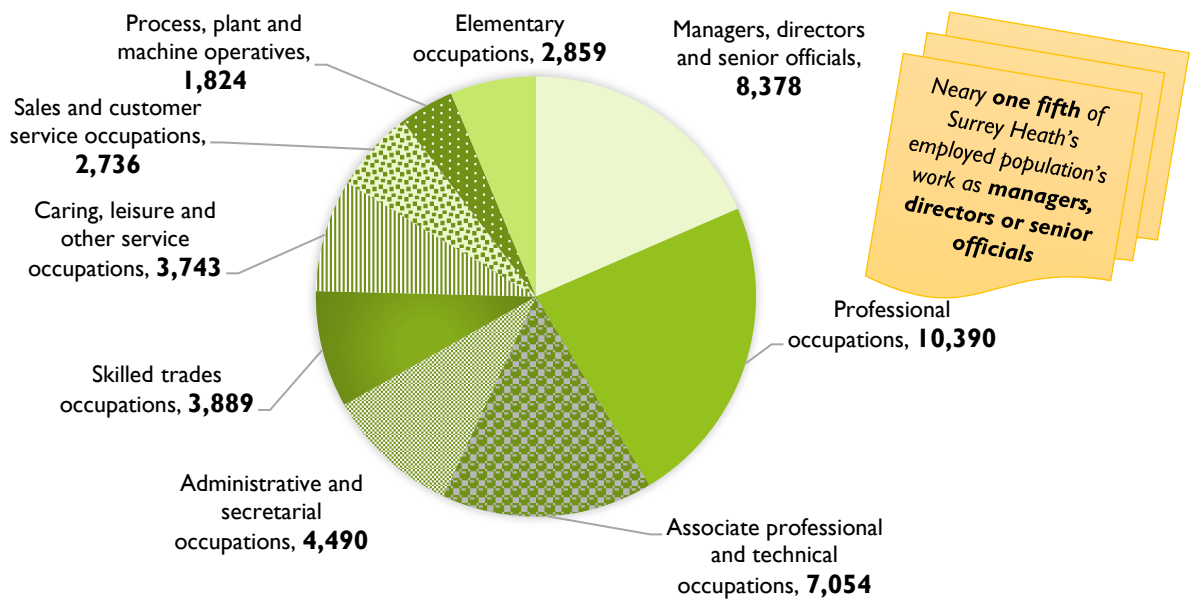

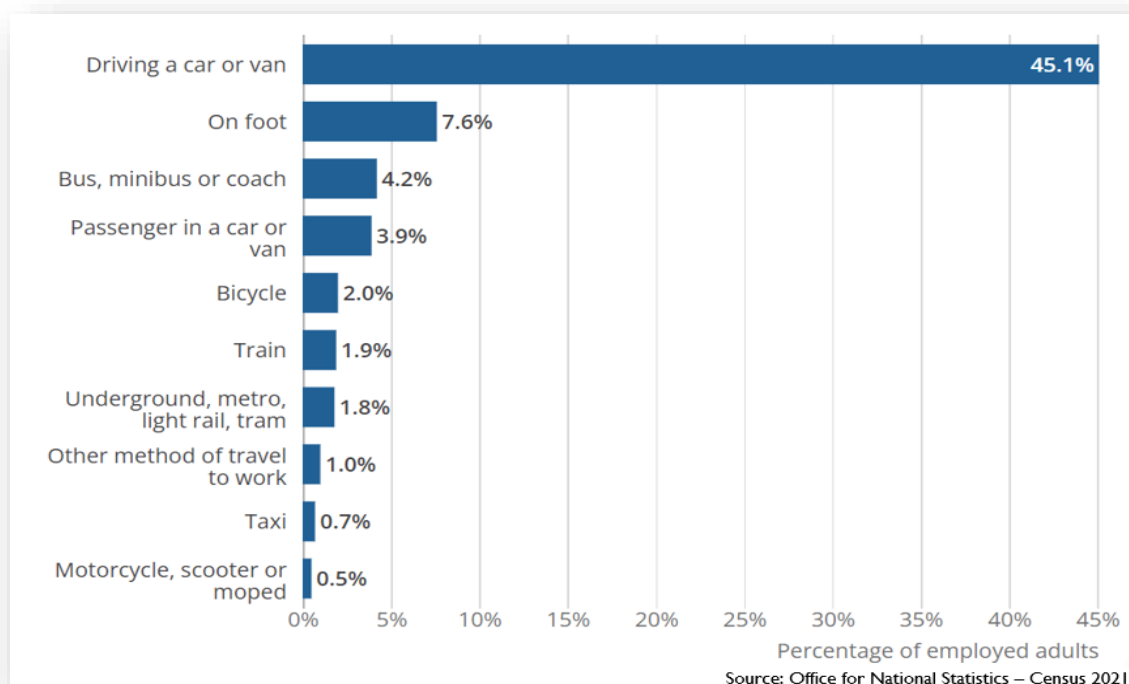

### England & Wales: Method used to travel to work, usual residents aged 16 and over in employment graph 2021

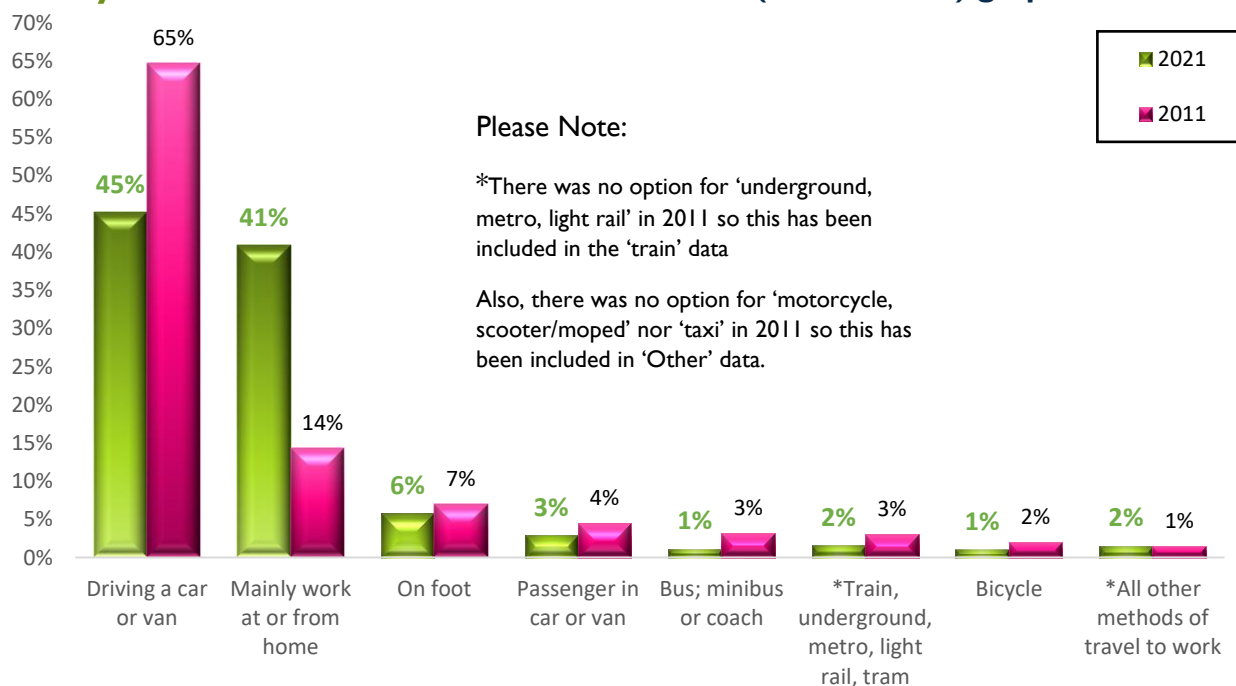

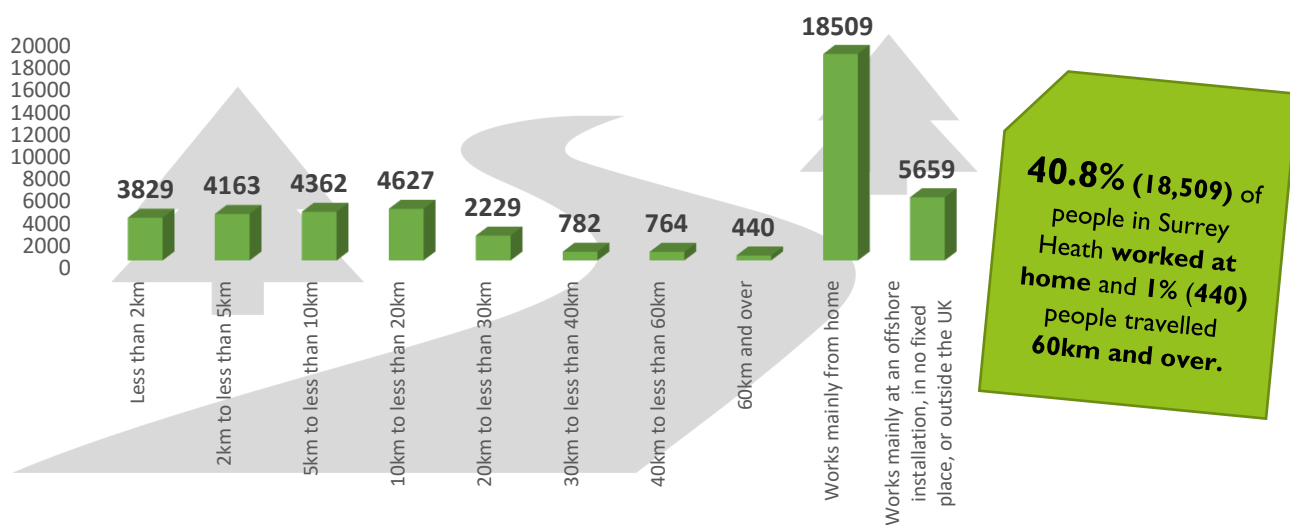
### Surrey Heath: Method used to Travel to Work (2011 vs 2021) graph %

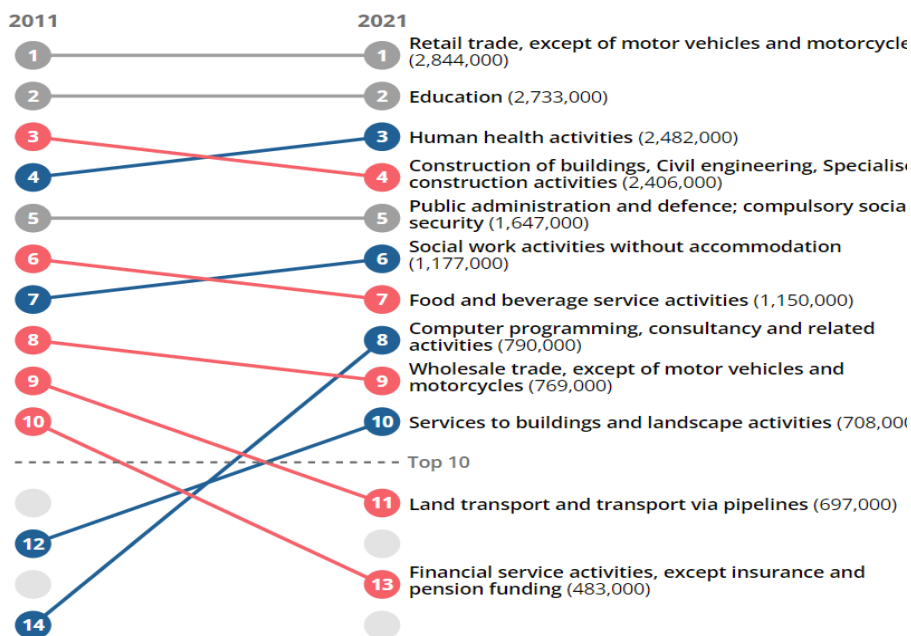
## England and Wales

In England and Wales, there were 27.8 million usual residents aged 16 years and over in employment in the week before Census Day, 21 March 2021 (57.2% of all usual residents aged 16 years and over).

The broad industries that employed the largest numbers of people in England and Wales at the time of Census 2021 were:

- wholesale, retail and motor trade (15.0% of usual residents aged 16 years and over in employment, 4.2 million)
- human health and social work activities (14.7%, 4.1 million)
- education (9.8%, 2.7 million)
- construction (8.7%, 2.4 million)
- manufacturing (7.3%, 2.0 million)

## OCCUPATION

In Census 2021, respondents aged 16 years and over were asked for their full job titles (for their main job, or if not working their last main job) and the main activity of their employer.

The data published with this statistical bulletin include occupational data broken down into 104 minor groups. These can be combined into the following nine high-level occupational categories:

**Managers, Directors And Senior Officials** (minor groups including production managers and directors; managers and directors in retail and wholesale; chief executives and senior officials)

**Professional Occupations** (minor groups including teaching and other educational professionals; information technology professionals; nursing and midwifery professionals)

**Associate Professional And Technical Occupations** (minor groups including sales, marketing and related associate professionals; artistic, literary and media occupations; welfare and housing associate professionals)

**Administrative And Secretarial Occupations** (minor groups including secretarial and related occupations; administrative occupations in finance)

**Skilled Trades Occupations** (minor groups including construction and building trades; food preparation and hospitality trades; agricultural and related trades)

**Caring, Leisure And Other Service Occupations** (minor groups including caring personal services; teaching and childcare support occupations; hairdressers and related services)

**Sales And Customer Service Occupations** (minor groups including sales assistants and retail cashiers; customer service occupations)

**Process, Plant And Machine Operatives** (minor groups including road transport drivers; process operatives)

**Elementary Occupations** (minor groups including elementary cleaning occupations; elementary storage occupations)

# HOUSING

## Tenure

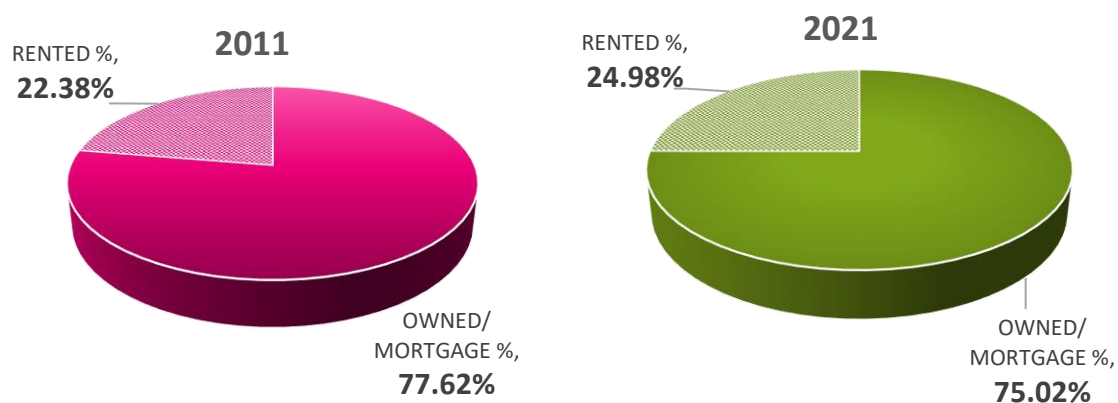
Tenure is whether a household rents or owns the accommodation that it occupies.

There was a decrease in owned properties (owned outright/with a mortgage/loan or shared ownership) in Surrey Heath in 2021 compared to 2011 from 77.62% to 75.02%, and an increase in rented properties (social rented, private rented, live rent free) from 22.38% in 2011 to 24.98% in 2021)

Three quarters of Surrey Heath either owned their house outright or with a mortgage whilst a quarter rented.

44% of Surrey Heath's homes are detached, 25% are semi-detached, 12% Terraced and 15% Flats.

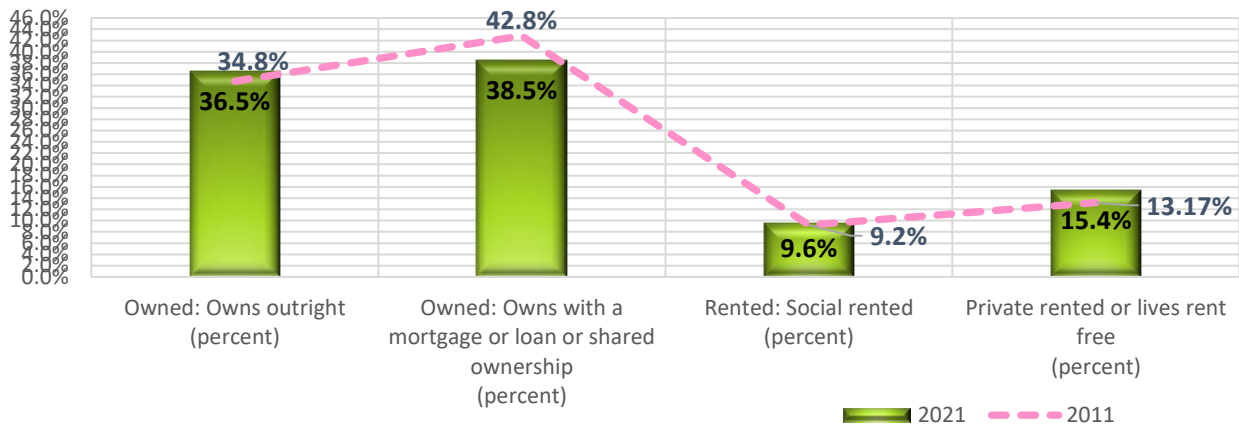
### Surrey Heath: Tenure – Owned and Rented 2011 vs 2021



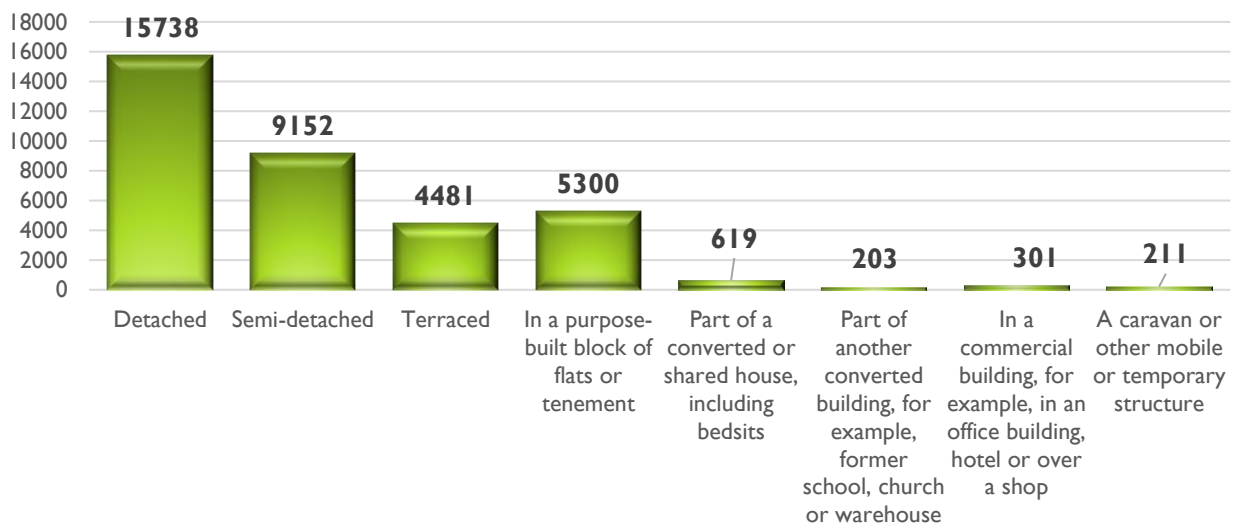
- Mole Valley had the highest percentage of properties owned outright with 40.8%
- Reigate and Banstead had the highest percentage within Surrey owned with a mortgage, loan or shared ownership with 39%
- Runnymede had the highest percentage of residents who rented (social rented) with 12.9%
- Woking the highest percentage of Private rented or those who live rent free 21.2%



### Surrey Heath: Tenure comparison between 2011 and 2021

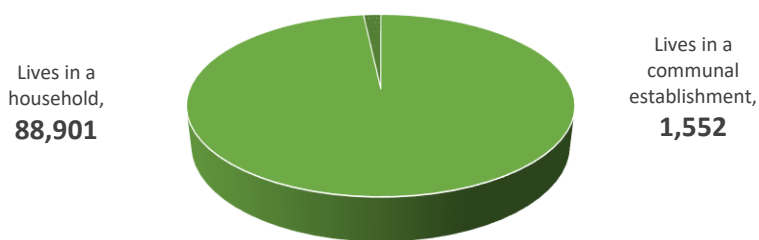


### Surrey Heath: Accommodation Type

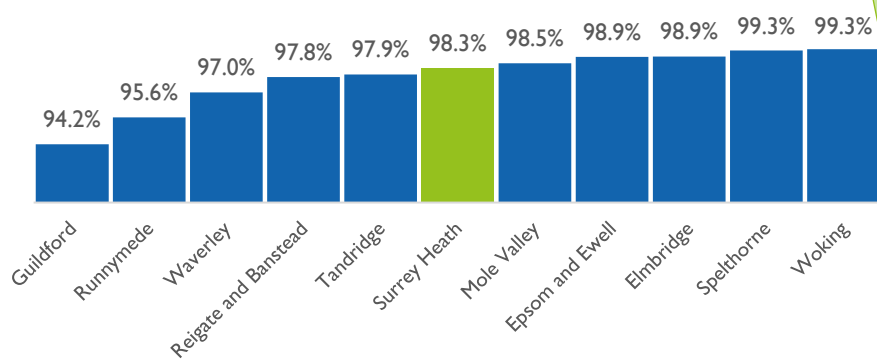
### Surrey Heath: Residence Type

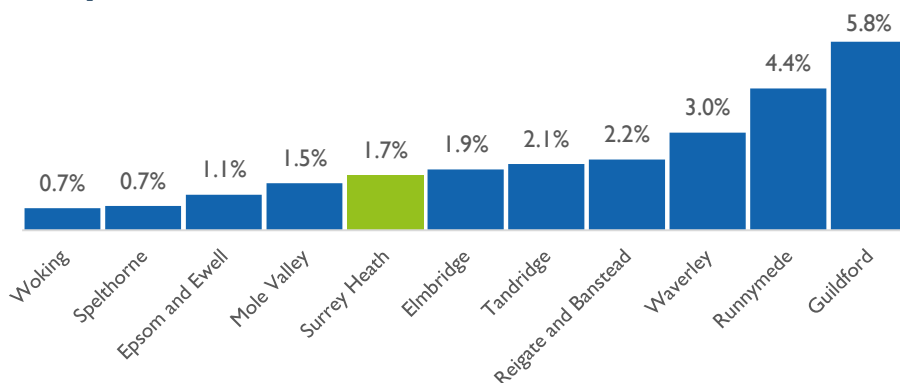

## Rooms, bedrooms, and occupancy

A room can be any room in a dwelling apart from bathrooms, toilets, halls or landings, kitchens, conservatories or utility rooms. All other rooms, for example, living rooms, studies, bedrooms, separate dining rooms and rooms that can only be used for storage are included. If two rooms have been converted into one, they are counted as one room.

The number of rooms is recorded by address, this means that for households living in a shared dwelling the number of rooms are counted for the whole dwelling and not the individual household.

This definition is based on the Valuation Office Agency's (VOA) definition.

Census 2021 used Valuation Office Agency (VOA) data to count the number of rooms in a dwelling. This was instead of asking the question on the census form.

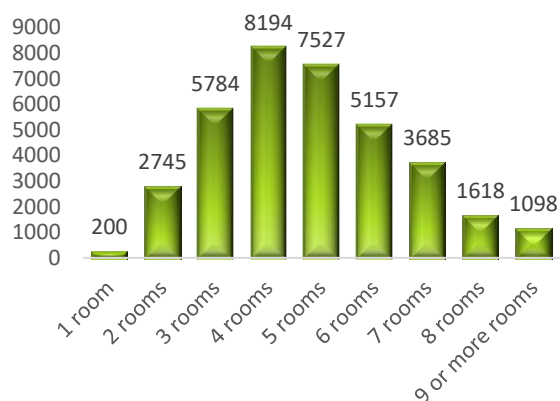
Please note that the VOA method for counting number of rooms differs in several ways from the method used in the 2011 Census.

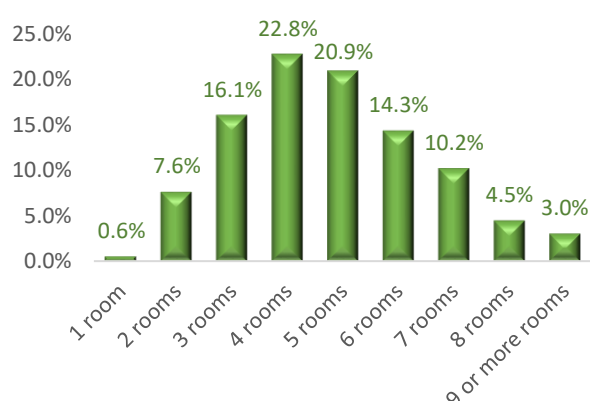

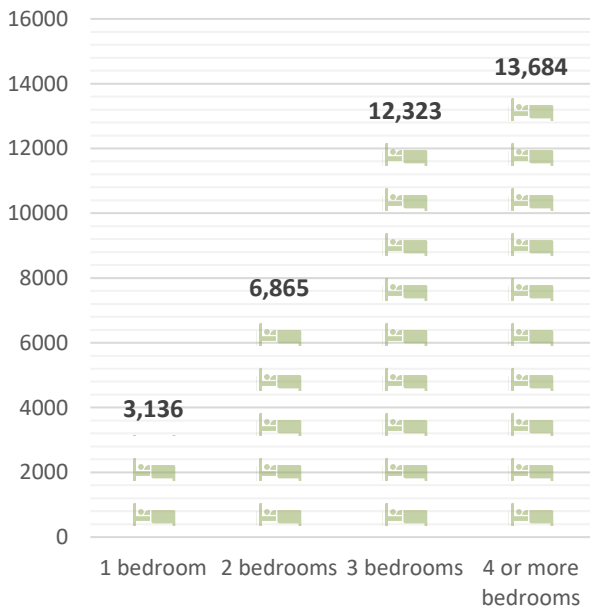
### England and Wales

The data show that the proportion of households with one, two, or three bedrooms decreased across the past decade, whereas the proportion with four or more bedrooms increased:

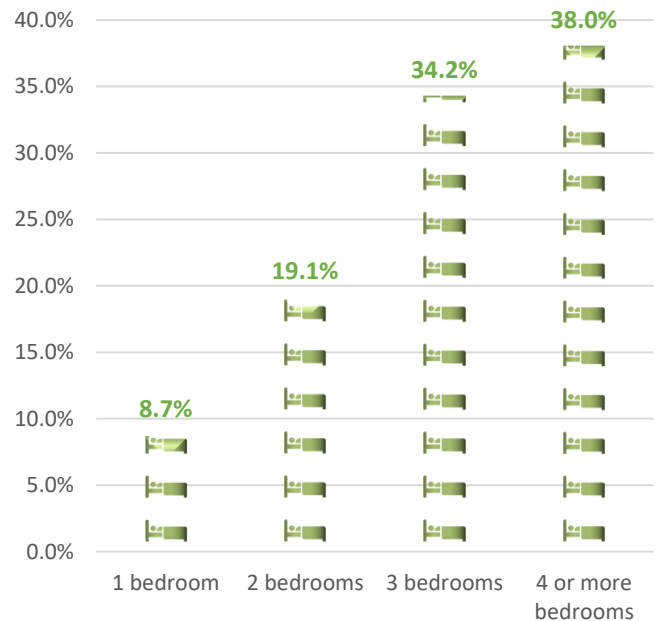
- 11.4% (2.8 million) of households had one bedroom (down from 11.8%, 2.8 million in 2011)
- 27.1% (6.7 million) had two bedrooms (down from 27.6%, 6.5 million in 2011)
- 40.4% (10.0 million) had three bedrooms (down from 41.6%, 9.7 million in 2011)
- 21.1% (5.2 million) had four or more bedrooms (up from 19.0%, 4.4 million in 2011)

The percentage of households that had three bedrooms was higher in Wales (48.0%) than in England (40.0%), whereas the percentage of households with four or more bedrooms was slightly higher in England (21.1%) than in Wales (20.6%).

## Overcrowding and under-occupancy

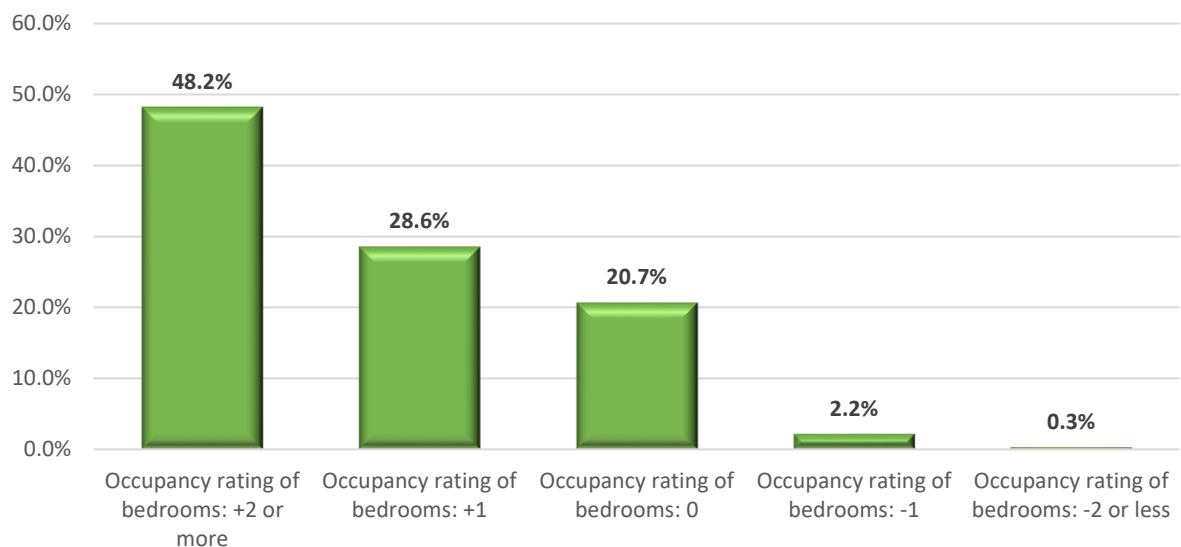
Occupancy rating provides a measure of whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded or under-occupied.

An occupancy rating of negative 1 or less implies that a household has fewer bedrooms than the standard requirement, positive 1 implies that they have more bedrooms than required, and 0 implies that they met the standard required.

### England and Wales

Across England and Wales as a whole, 4.3% of households (1.1 million) had fewer bedrooms than required, down from 4.5% (1.1 million) in 2011. Some 26.5% (6.6 million) of households had the required number of bedrooms, and the remaining 69.2% (17.2 million) of households had more bedrooms than required.

Conversely, the proportion of households that had more bedrooms than required was higher in Wales (76.3%, 1.0 million) than it was in England (68.8%, 16.1 million).



## Central Heating

### England and Wales

The vast majority of households across England and Wales reported that they had central heating in 2021 (98.5%, 24.4 million). However, 1.5% (367,000) of households had no central heating.

The most common responses were, mains gas (73.8%, 18.3 million), two or more types of central heating (not including renewable energy; 8.5%, 2.1 million) and electric (8.5%, 2.1 million).

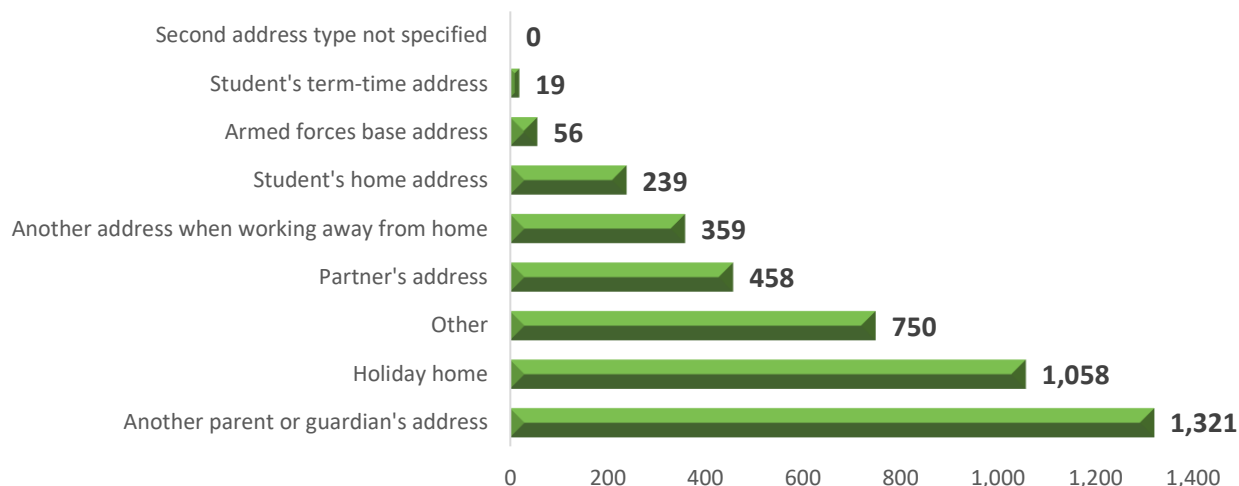

## GENDER IDENTITY

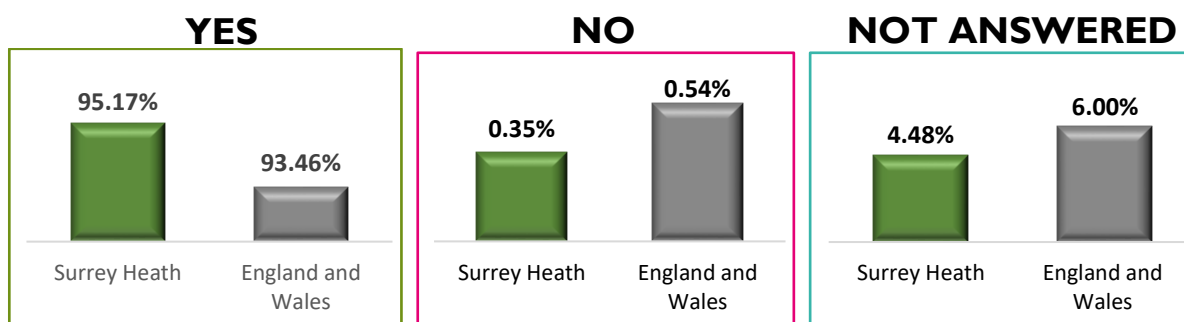
**“Is the gender you identify with the same as your sex registered at birth?”**

Gender identity refers to a person’s sense of their own gender, whether male, female or another category such as non-binary. This may or may not be the same as their sex registered at birth.

The question on gender identity was new for Census 2021. It was added to provide the first official data on the size of the transgender population in England and Wales.

The question was voluntary and was only asked of people aged 16 years and over. People were asked “Is the gender you identify with the same as your sex registered at birth?”, and had the option of selecting either “Yes”, or selecting “No” and writing in their gender identity.

**Surrey Heath:** Is the gender you identify with the same as your sex registered at birth?

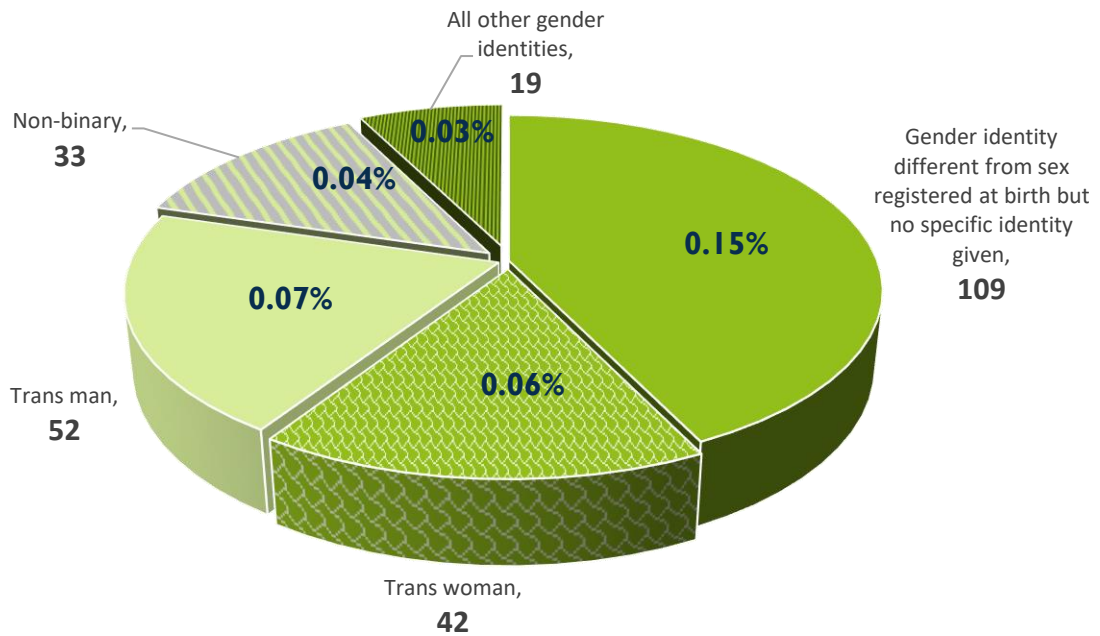

## SEXUAL ORIENTATION

*“Which of the following describes your sexual orientation?”*

- *Straight/Heterosexual*
- *Gay or Lesbian*
- *Bisexual*
- *Other sexual orientation (specify)”*

Sexual orientation is an umbrella term covering sexual identity, attraction, and behaviour. For an individual respondent, these may not be the same. For example, someone in an opposite-sex relationship may also experience same-sex attraction, and vice versa. This means the statistics should be interpreted purely as showing how people responded to the question, rather than being about whom they are attracted to or their actual relationships.

The question on sexual orientation was new for Census 2021. They previously collected data on sexual orientation through the Annual Population Survey (APS), but including the question on the census questionnaire enables a much more detailed understanding of sexual orientation in England and Wales. The data will meet the needs for better quality information on the LGB+ population (“gay or lesbian”, “bisexual” or “other sexual orientation”) for monitoring and supporting anti-discrimination duties under the Equality Act 2010.

The question was voluntary and was only asked of people aged 16 years and over. People were asked “Which of the following best describes your sexual orientation?”. The different sexual orientations that people could choose from included:

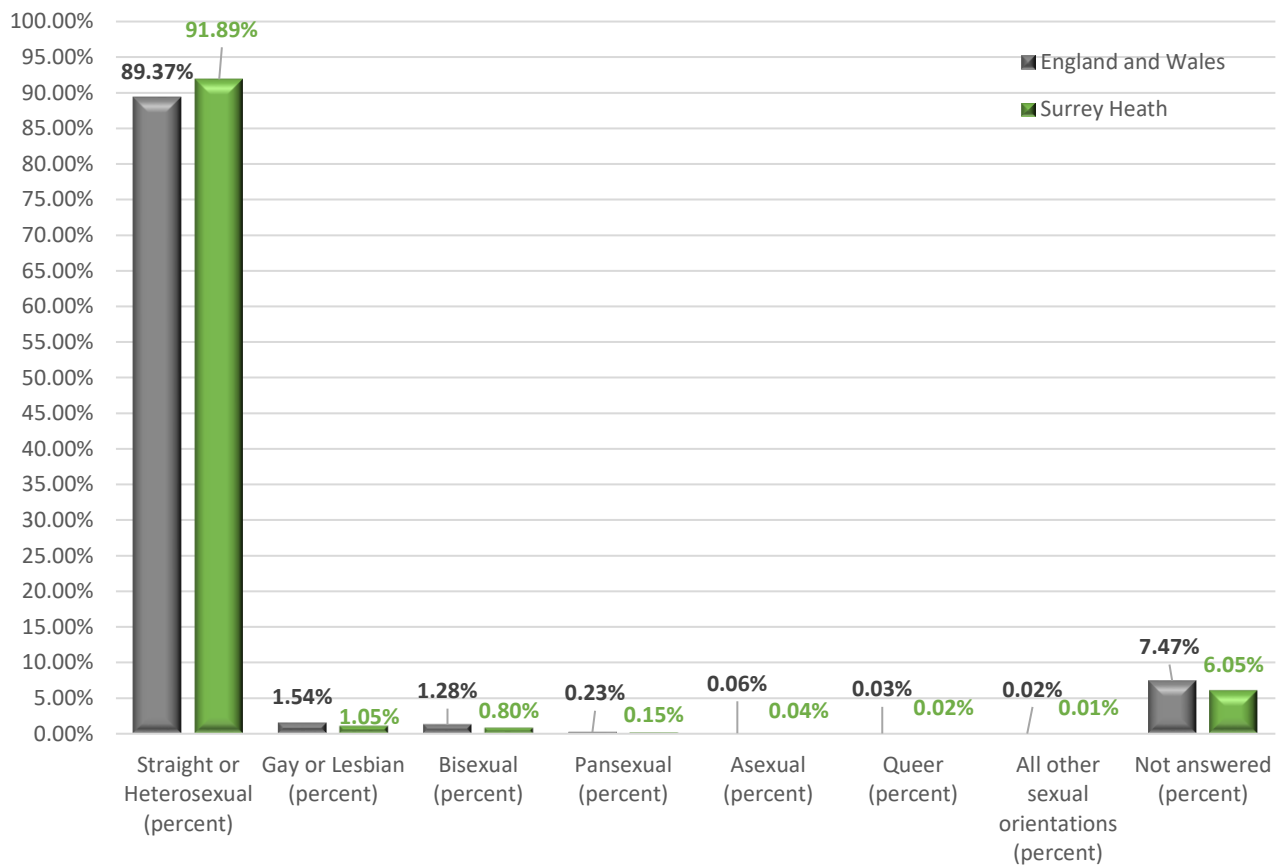
- straight or heterosexual
- gay or lesbian
- bisexual
- other sexual orientation

If they selected “Other sexual orientation”, they were asked to write in the sexual orientation with which they identified.

In total, 44.9 million people answered the question (92.5% of the population aged 16 years and over in England and Wales).

# EDUCATION

## Education - England and Wales

The number of schoolchildren and full-time students in England and Wales has increased.

Residents of England and Wales aged 16 years and over (48.6 million) were asked to record any qualifications (including academic, vocational, and professional qualifications) they had achieved in England, Wales or worldwide. This is used to calculate the highest level of qualification (so, the highest level of qualification that an individual reported irrespective of previous qualifications listed) using the following categories:

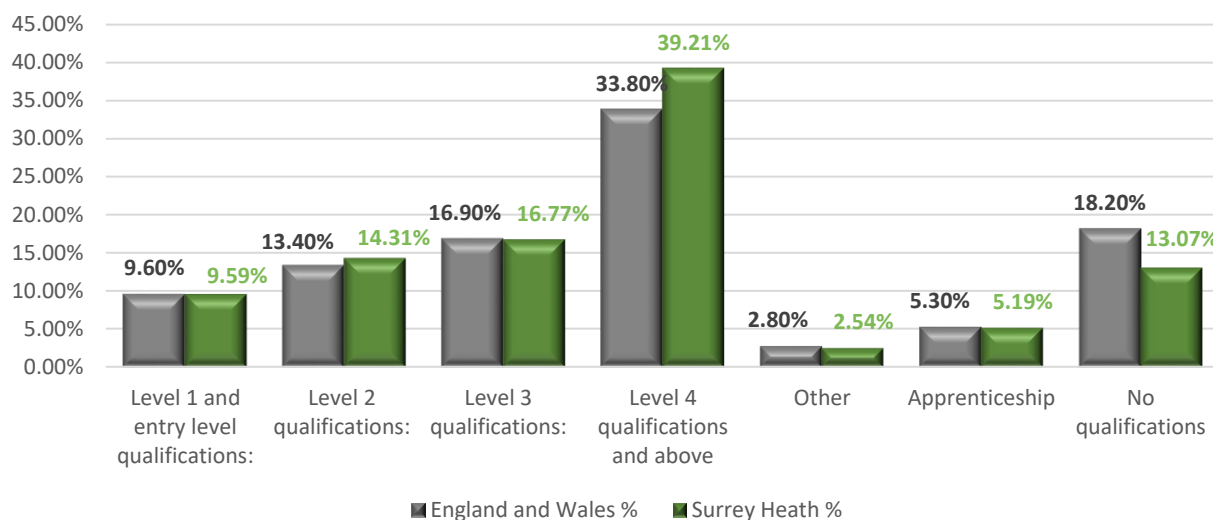
- no qualifications: no formal qualifications
- Level 1: one to four GCSE passes (grade A\* to C or grade 4 and above) and any other GCSEs at other grades, or equivalent qualifications
- Level 2: five or more GCSE passes (grade A\* to C or grade 4 and above) or equivalent qualifications
- apprenticeships
- Level 3: two or more A Levels or equivalent qualifications
- Level 4 or above: Higher National Certificate, Higher National Diploma, Bachelor's degree, or post-graduate qualifications
- other qualifications, of unknown level

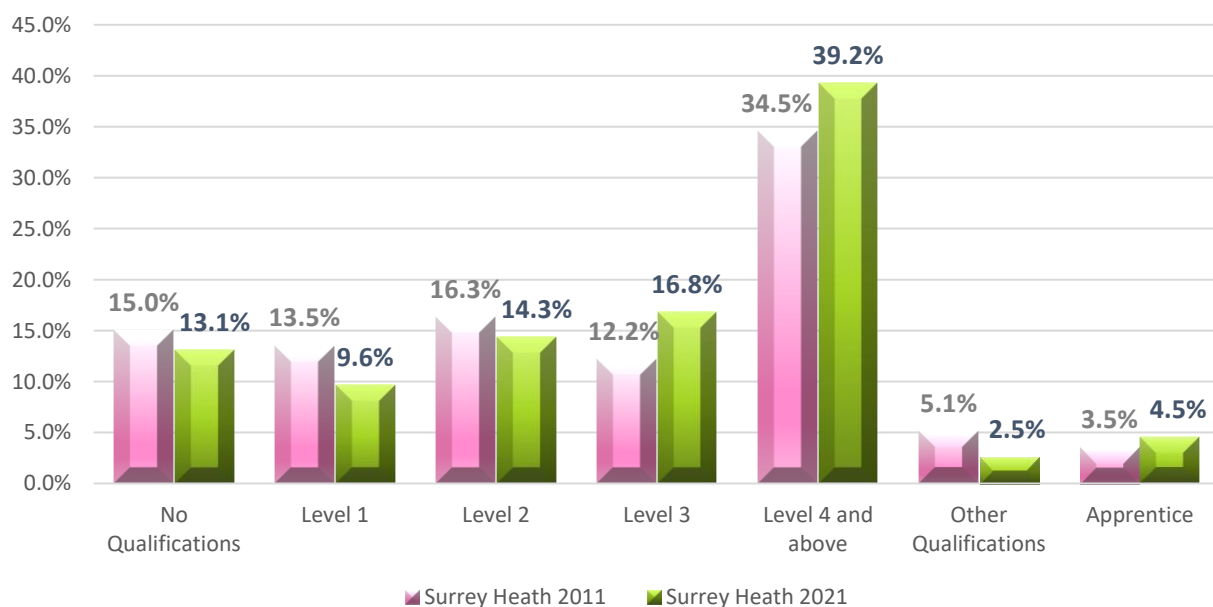




### Surrey Heath: Highest Level of Qualification (16 and over) England and Wales vs Surrey Heath



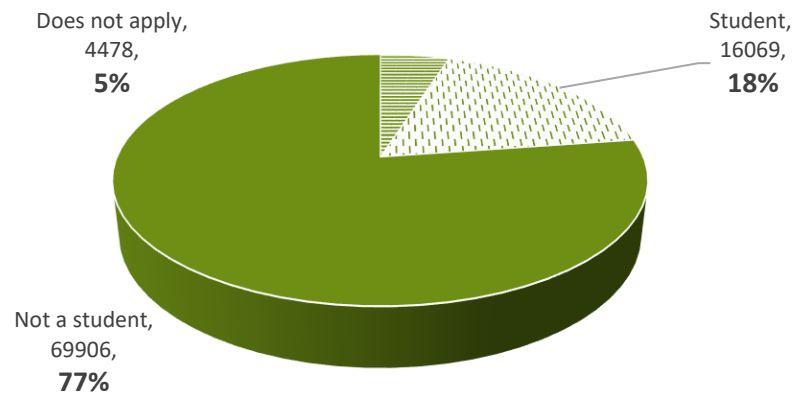
### Surrey Heath: Highest Level of Qualification (16 and over) % 2011 vs 2021

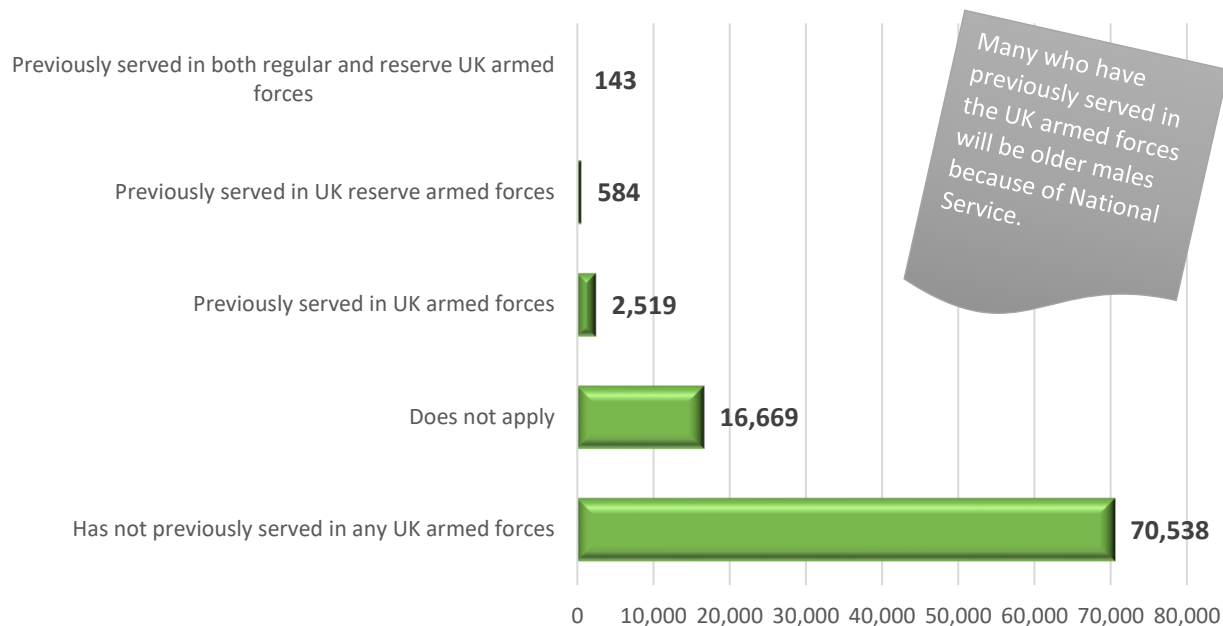

# HEALTH, DISABILITY & UNPAID CARE

## Explanation from ONS - Age Standardising Data

### What does this mean and why does it matter?

*“Health, disability and unpaid care, are all closely related to the age of a population. In a more elderly population, you would expect poorer health, more disability and more unpaid care.*

*Comparing between time periods or two different geographic areas can be problematic as the population’s characteristics can vary. For example, we know the number of elderly people in the England and Wales population has increased over this period, so would a finding of poorer health in 2021 be directly due to a decline in health, or just reflect that the population has aged?*

*Similarly, we now know that very good general health has improved between 2011 and 2021, but without standardising the data, the extent of health improvements could be masked by poorer health of the older population.*

*There’s a similar problem when we compare between geographies. We might find that disability prevalence in one local authority is much lower than another and conclude that there’s a lower proportion of disabled people in the first area. This could be true, but if one of the populations is younger, this finding isn’t necessarily related to better health, just a younger age distribution.*

*Similarly, two geographical areas may have the same proportion of disabled people for one age group (known as the age specific rate) but will have different overall rates if the age structure of the population is different.*

*To enable us to make meaningful comparisons of, health, disability and unpaid care outcomes when we compare across age groups, over time or between geographies, we age standardise the data. Age-standardised proportions (ASPs) take into consideration both population size and age-structure, essentially evening them out so that you can compare like with like.*

*When using ASPs to compare between local authorities, we can say that the higher proportion of disabled people found in Blackpool and Blaenau Gwent is due to a difference in prevalence, rather than, for instance, a difference in the age or size of the population.*

*Standardised data is valuable to users who would want to understand differences in one area in comparison with others. Which areas are doing better or worse? Has health improved or got worse over time? This has implications for policy making, holding organisations that spend public money to account, and informing wider public debate.*

*Of course, there are instances where it is more useful to use non-standardised data. Service providers like GPs, social services and local charities are more likely to need to know about the population in their area and what proportion have health concerns or a disability. This helps in understanding what needs exist in an area and planning service provision to support them. For this reason, we have also published non-standardised data in tables accompanying our topic summaries.”*



## Disability

*“Do you have any physical or mental health conditions or illnesses lasting or expected to last 12 months or more?”*

If yes

*“Do any of your conditions or illnesses reduce your ability to carry out day-to-day activities?” was asked.*

The Census 2021 results about disability include data about the level of disability.

Levels of disability are closely related to age since older people are more likely to be disabled.

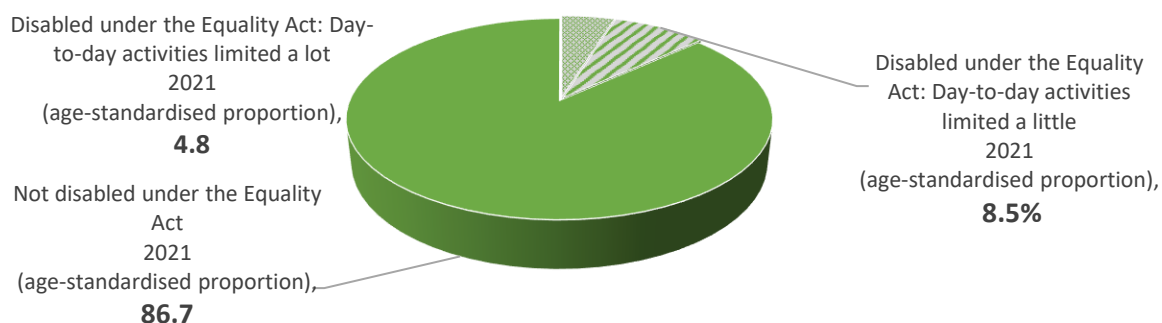
To overcome the data has been age-standardised. This makes it easier to compare the data across age groups, over time and between different geographic areas because it accounts for differences in the population size and age structure.

The identification of disability differs from the 2011 Census question used, which asked "Are your day-to-day activities limited because of a health problem or disability which has lasted, or expected to last, at least 12 months?".

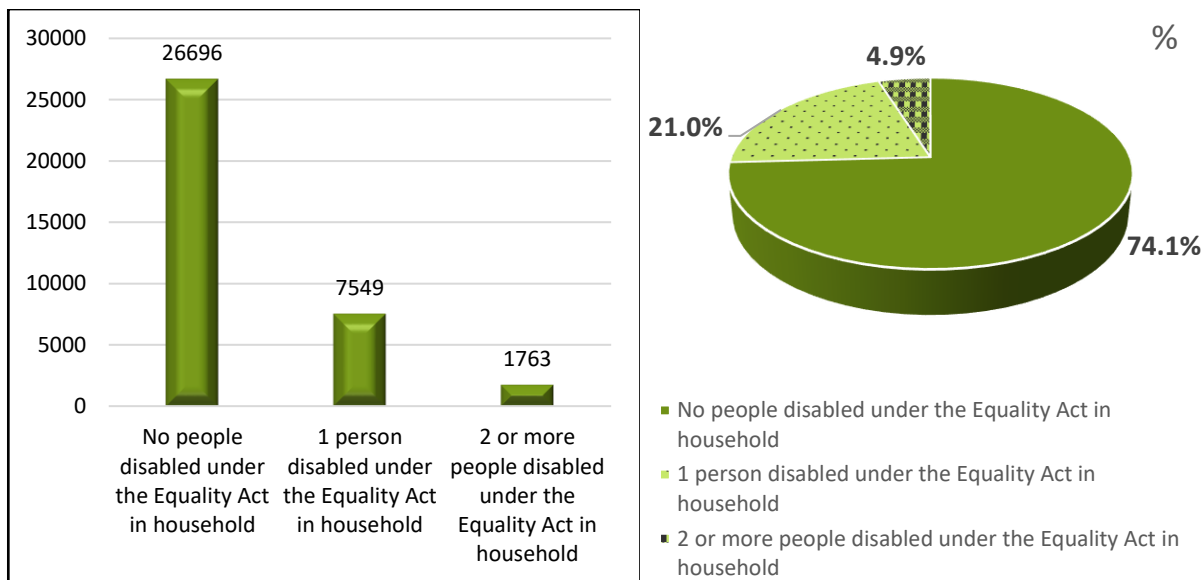
The question changed in order to collect data that more closely aligned with the definition of disability in the Equality Act (2010).

Census 2021 was undertaken during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, which may also have influenced how people perceive their health status and activity limitations and therefore may affect how people chose to respond.

### Surrey Heath: Disability Age-Standardised Proportion%

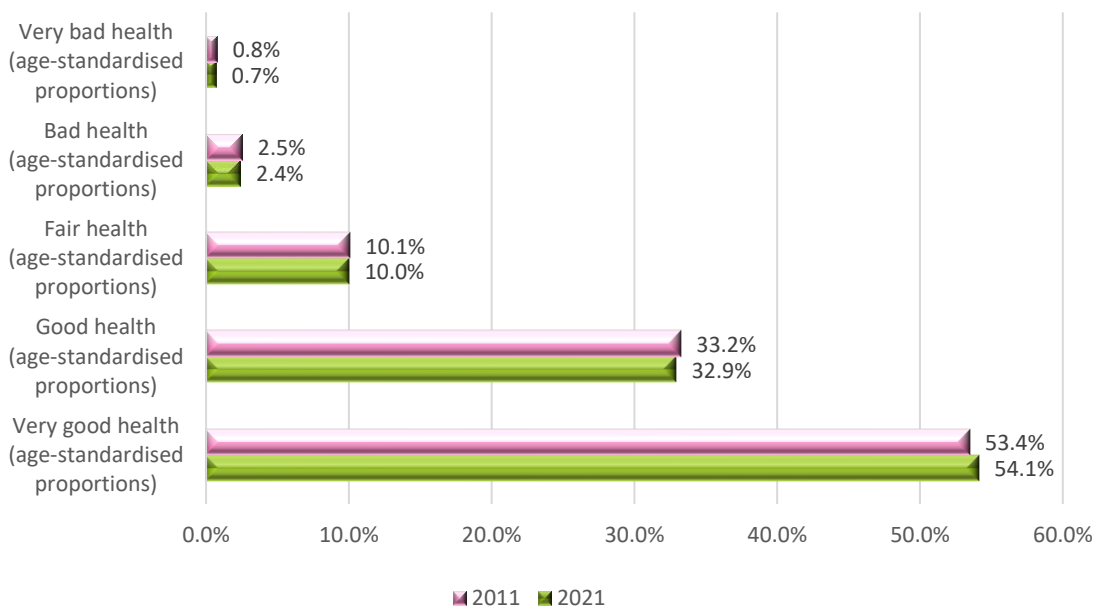


### Surrey Heath: Disability: Households where at least one person was identified as disabled (Age-Standardised)

### Surrey Heath: General Health

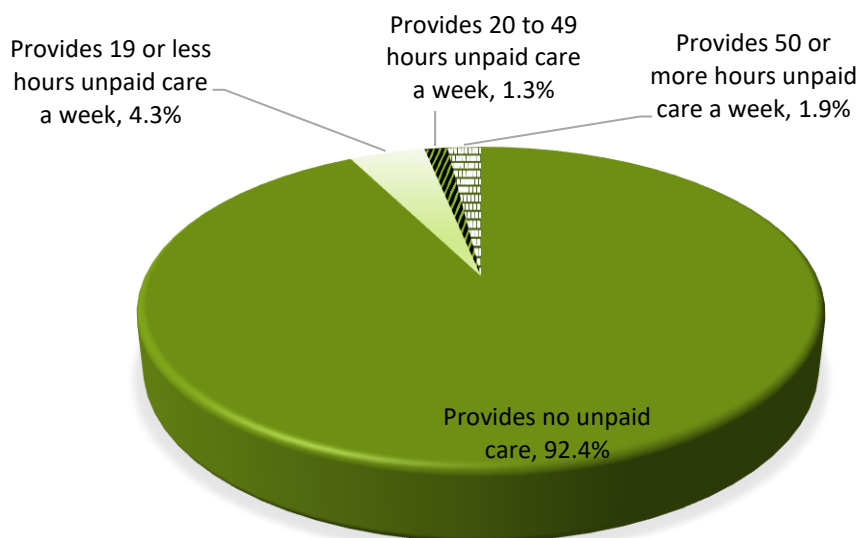


## Unpaid Carers

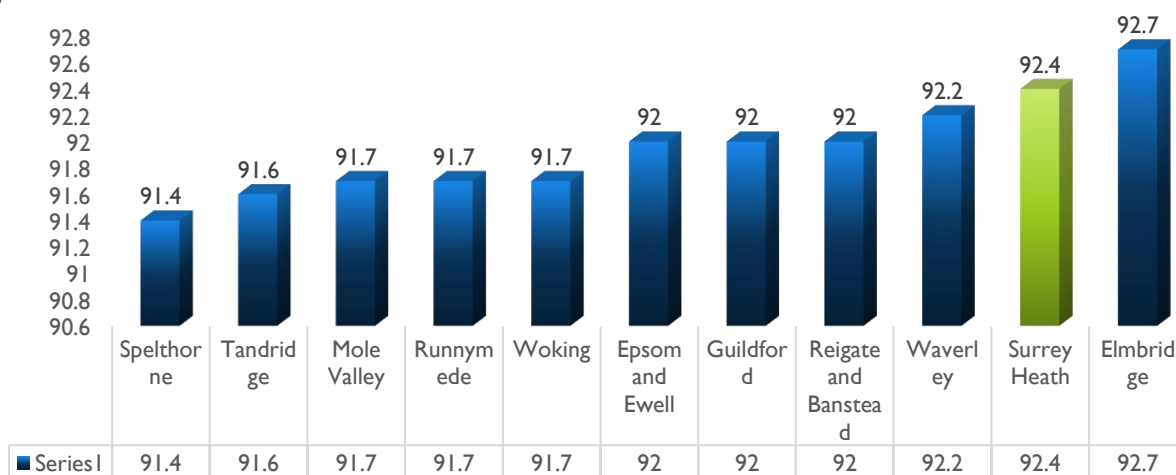
Unpaid carers are people who look after, or give any help or support to, anyone with long-term physical or mental health conditions or illnesses. They could also offer support to anyone with problems related to old age, excluding anything they do as part of paid employment.

The provision of unpaid care is closely related to the age of a population. In a more elderly population, you would expect more unpaid care provision.

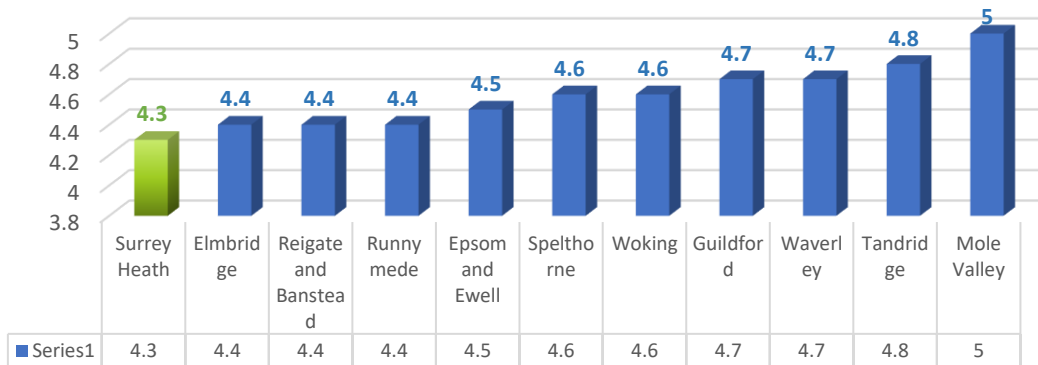
### Surrey Heath: Provision of unpaid care, age-standardised proportions %



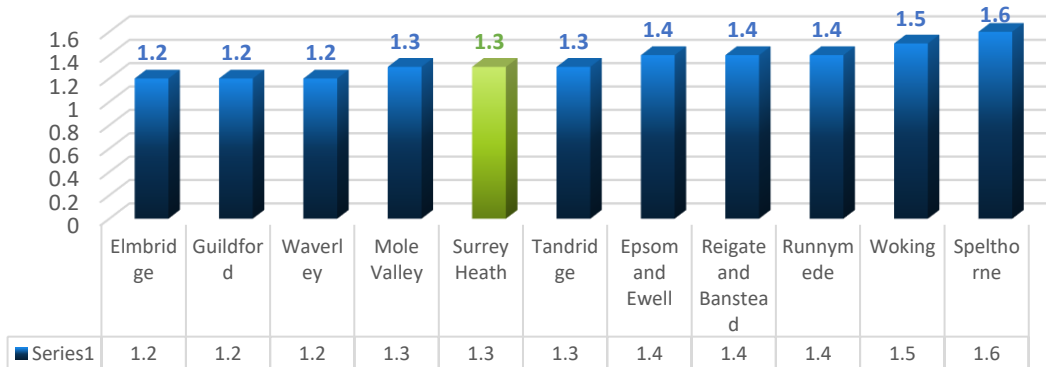
### Surrey Local Authorities: Provides no unpaid care, age-standardised proportions %



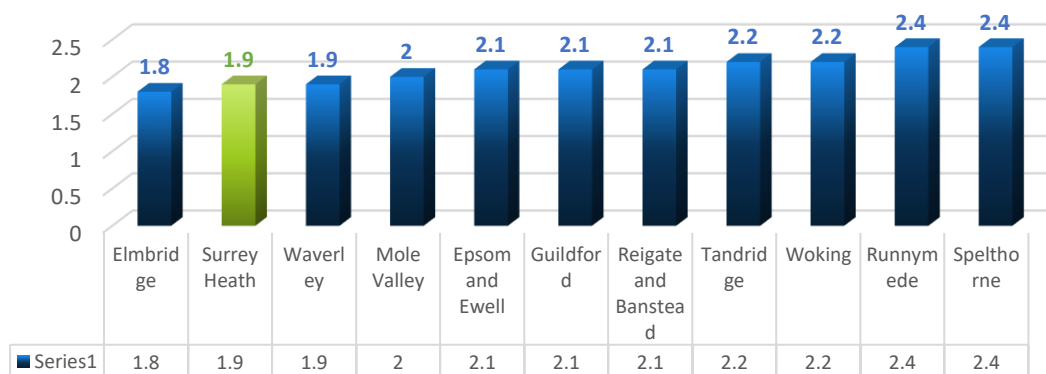
**Surrey Local Authorities: Provides 19 or less hours unpaid care a week age-standardised proportions %**
